Life Insurance Companies Advised to Hew Strictly to the Line.

LAWYER HUGHES' SPEECH

RECENT EXPOSURES WILL RESULT IN GOOD.

New York, May 22.—Charles K. Hughes, former counsel of the Armstrong insurance investigating committee, spoke at the annual dinner of the Life Underwriters' association at the Hotel Savoy tonight, given in honor of the executive committee of the organization.

"Even great life insurance companies," Mr. Hughes said, "are not autocratic or oligarchic. They are democratic, and nothing is of greater importance than that every one connected with a mutual company should be first and always his responsibility to the policy-holders who are the beneficiaries of his work."

Conservatism Will Prevail.

"I believe it will be found that under the conditions that are enforced by the legislation recently enacted conservatism will prevail; that those only will be entrusted with the important duties who are worthy of confidence. In no other way can I conceive the choice to be made when those who are voted for stand exposed to public criticism for a period of several months."

Law the Line of Safety.

"The line of safety for the life insurance company is the line marked out by the law; the line of prudent investment; the line of maintaining the life insurance business as life insurance business; the line which will be followed by those who have an eye single to that business and not to other undertakings which promise larger benefits for themselves."

Caldwell Heresy Case Took Up the Time Yesterday.

Greenville, S. C., May 22.—The general assembly of the Southern Presbyterian church today took up the consideration of the Caldwell heresy case, and arguments on the case will be heard through a large part of tomorrow's sessions. The action of the synod of Texas in suspending Dr. W. E. Caldwell from the pastorate of the First Presbyterian church of Fort Worth was the subject under consideration, and the opinion is expressed tonight that the assembly will overrule the action of the synod and reinstate Dr. Caldwell as pastor of the church.

The report of the committee on closer relations which was submitted to the assembly today was made the special order for 11 o'clock tomorrow morning. A majority report was submitted, which favored the decision of what is known as the Charlotte conference, which recommended the establishment of an ecclesiastical council to be known as "the council of the Reformed churches in America holding the Presbyterian system."
