

COMPROMISE ON THE INDIAN BILL

Utah Is Remembered With Appropriation of \$600,000 for Irrigation.

Washington, May 24.—Complete agreement has been reached by the conferees on the Indian appropriation bill on all points of dispute between the senate and house, and the report was signed today.

No allotment of lands in severalty to Indians on the various reservations shall become liable to the satisfaction of any debt contracted prior to the issuing of the final patent.

Officers of the army shall not serve as Indian agents. An appropriation of \$100,000 is made to purchase land for landless Indians in California.

A compromise substitute in relation to the sale or disposition of unallotted lands in the Colorado and Utah reservations in Idaho was agreed to, and it was provided that any coal or oil deposits shall remain the property of the United States.

A compromise provision relating to the coal lands of the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations was adopted. For the construction of irrigation systems to irrigate the unallotted lands of the Uncompahgre, Uintah and White River areas in Utah \$500,000 is appropriated, of which \$125,000 is made immediately available.

HONOR QUEEN VICTORIA. Canadians in Zion Celebrate Her Birthday.

Empire Day, the national day of Queen Victoria, was observed yesterday by the Canadians of Salt Lake with an informal supper at Unity hall. Owing to the absence from town of a number of the prominent members of the local society, including G. Tyrrell, president of the association, it was decided to make last night's event an informal one and call it the first annual supper.

PIONEER OF STATE DIES. W. R. Jones, Veteran of Mexican and Indian Wars, Passes Away.

William R. Jones, a pioneer of Utah, aged 85 years, died last evening at his home, 629 South Eighth West, of senile debility.

DEPUTIES MAKE A BLUFF. No Disorder at Plum Run Mines, Which Start Up With Non-Union Miners.

Stuebenville, O., May 24.—The Plum Run mines of the United States Coal company were started today with 125 non-union men. The men were escorted to the mines by armed guards. They were kept at clearing up the mine today, and coal is expected to be mined tomorrow.

great economic forces that today prevail in the civilized world were true. Republicans in many places admitted it. There were a great many Democrats in the country who believe whether rightly or not that the Democratic candidate was largely sponsored by and represented the class as to which the masses of the Democratic party charged that the Republican party was in partnership with. Thousands of Republicans therefore would otherwise have deserted their party voted for Roosevelt and thousands of Democrats voted for him, too.

Agreement With Democrats.

"In the senate of the United States combats were made with some Republicans and many Democrats, and we are informed by the Record, and which I believe is the truth, there was at one time arrived at an arrangement by which it was proposed to pass the law, ever assured to the president upon the basis of an amendment to the rate provision of the so-called restricted court review and for a suspension of interlocutory injunction.

Bound Hand and Foot.

"What is one of the results? Henceforth our fight is against the Republican party and its iniquity, and Roosevelt is not the man to lead us. He is now bound hand and foot to the criterion of the other end of the political that dominates the Republican policies in that body and he can never again act independently of his party, having abdicated formally and substantially himself for the party's sake."

Dalzell's Reply.

Representative Dalzell of Pennsylvania was warmly applauded as he rose to speak on the tariff at the conclusion of the speech of Mr. Towne. Mr. Dalzell declared that wages have risen twice as much as the number of wage earners.

Portland, Ore., May 24.—President Howard Elliott and other members of the Northern Pacific company arrived in this city this afternoon. President Elliott stated that his mission is one of inspection. The party will remain here until Sunday, returning to St. Paul, where President Elliott will meet President Hill of the Great Northern.

Superintendent F. S. Elliott of the Denver and Rio Grande is at Eisinore directing the work of repairs to the bridge which has been damaged by washouts. High waters have done considerable damage to bridges and roadbeds.

Josephine Terranova Clearly Insane When She Killed Her Uncle and Aunt.

New York, May 24.—The defense of Josephine Terranova yesterday in her case today. The prosecution began its rebuttal by calling Assistant District Attorney Cardozo to testify that he had seen the woman's statement when she was arrested. She told the witness that on that occasion her heart told her to kill her uncle and aunt, and she said nothing about the voice of God prompting her, as she claimed it had during her testimony at the trial.

Rate Bill Emasculated.

"I regard the emasculation of the rate bill as pitiful. It was scarcely of much use in the first place, but it has been left of no value whatever. Some clauses, such as the publicity clause, are good enough, but the commission is really not given as much power as the interstate commerce commission had under the 1887 law. The commission should have the power to fix all rates. Under the bill, they may take up grievances, upon proper complaint, make, and establish a reasonable rate. How is the poor man going to be able to afford to make complaint and set the machinery in motion? The commission should have power to investigate and fix fair rates whether complaint has been legally made or not. Then the unlimited court review will take each complaint before judges, who have many of them, and the corporation lawyers, and injunctions and delays will carry a matter over for years. The rate as fixed by the commission should be final, except when reversed by the supreme court, who could only pass on the constitutionality of the bill. The bill is no good. There is no possible chance for the small shipper to get a grievance remedied."

TRACKS ARE JOINED.

Western Pacific and Rio Grande Connect in Salt Lake.

The Western Pacific tracks and those of the Rio Grande were united yesterday at Sixth street between First and Second South streets. This junction marks the birth of a new transcontinental road with Salt Lake as its western center. Uniting the tracks was done by the two companies' hands sons of Greece without ceremony. The section boss pronounced the rails straight and level. That was the only speech made.

The tracks are laid between Sixth West and the Jordan river, and in a few weeks will be stretched to the coast. The grade to this point has been completed, and the work of stringing ties finished. Rails will be distributed along the line and laid quickly. From Buena Vista the tracks will continue toward the edge of the lake.

PLANS SECOND LINE.

Portland and San Francisco Will Have Another Connection.

San Francisco, May 24.—E. H. Harriman gave orders by wire yesterday to officials in Portland and San Francisco to construct immediately a new road eight miles in length, from the mouth of the Shasta River in Oregon to the coast at Marshfield, on Coos bay, in the same state. This road will form the northern part of a new coast line between San Francisco and Portland, thus connecting those cities by two steel highways.
