

# JURIST TO HEAD IDAHO TICKET

## Chief Justice C. O. Stockslager to Be the Democratic Nominee for Governor.

### FIFTEEN YEARS ON BENCH

### WAR ON CHURCH IN POLITICS TO BE ISSUE OF THE CAMPAIGN.

(Special to The Herald.)  
Boise, Ida., May 26.—Chief Justice C. O. Stockslager of the supreme court will probably be the Democratic nominee this fall for governor of Idaho. No other candidate is being considered now, and at the meeting of the Democratic state committee here Monday leaders from all parts of the state

Cleveland, during his first administration, made him an official of the United States land office at Halley, Ida. In 1890 Idaho was admitted to the Union. At that time Judge Stockslager had been living in the territory three years. His party convention nominated him for district judge, and he was elected over his Republican opponent. Twice thereafter he was elected to that position, and the Republicans on both occasions refused to nominate a candidate against him. His ability as a jurist was thus recognized by his political opponents, and when, in 1900, the Democrats and Populists of the state assembled in convention at Pocatello nominated him for justice of the supreme court, his judicial district gave him a record-breaking majority. For six years he has been upon the supreme bench, and, while Idaho lawyers occasionally "roast" the supreme tribunal of their state for its alleged favoritism to corporations, they invariably wind up by saying:

"Of course, Old Stocky is all right. He's absolutely on the square, and gives everybody an even break for his money."

Judge Stockslager isn't a pretty man in personal appearance. He's big and broad and tall. He's blind of one eye. John M. Thurston, afterward a brilliant United States senator from Nebraska, shot one of his eyes out on a Wood River hunting trip about twenty years ago. Who Will Be the Candidate of the Democrats for Governor of Idaho.

agreed that Judge Stockslager shall head their ticket. Ex-Senator Henry Heitfeld of Lewiston, who ran for governor two years ago, is not a candidate for another nomination this year.

Judge Stockslager is of Indiana lineage. As a boy he learned his Democracy at the feet of Daniel W. Voorhees, Thomas A. Hendricks and David Turpie. When a young man he removed to Kansas. There he was admitted to the bar, and there he lived until Grover

doesn't always brush. He isn't particular whether his vest and trousers match his coat or not. Monday, when the Democratic committee was in Boise he wore his long black coat and a vest of another color. It wasn't a fashionable "waistcoat"; it was just a plain gray vest, and the trousers matched neither coat nor vest.

But they do say that Judge Stockslager is a campaigner. He is a "mixer," not from affectation, but because it is his nature. He likes to mingle with people. His twenty years in Idaho have given him a personal acquaintance which will be of inestimable value to him in a campaign. In that respect he differs from Governor Gooding, who will be his Republican opponent. Gooding isn't a mixer; he has wealth and an air that shows his knowledge and appreciation of his possessions.

### No Pander to "Dynamiters."

Governor Gooding is trying to make the assassination of former Governor Steunenberg a campaign issue. His organs and his shouters say that his defeat will be tantamount to a repudiation by Idaho of law and order. But the nomination of Stockslager by the Democrats will puncture that issue. Presiding over the supreme court of the state, Judge Stockslager concurred in the opinion which denied the alleged assassins of Steunenberg their release on a writ of habeas corpus. It won't be possible to shout "dynamiter" at him. His nomination will eliminate the Steunenberg case from the campaign.

The Democrats are showing no disposition to pander to the sympathizers with the men who are accused of the Steunenberg murder. The first act of the state committee was to pass a resolution demanding the punishment of the men guilty of the murder. There isn't a Democratic leader in Idaho who will try to capture the labor vote on the issue of opposition to Governor Gooding's prosecution of the men accused.

### Mormonism the Issue.

From Senator Dubois down the Democratic leaders have determined to wage their battle on the issue of opposition to the Mormon church. The breach between the Idaho "unaffiliated" and the adherents of Mormonism is too wide to be bridged. Democratic leaders have determined to carry their opposition to the church to the point of re-enacting the famous "test oath" in their own control of the legislature. In brief that means that the Democratic programme is to disfranchise each and every Mormon in Idaho. That is Senator Dubois' plan, and back of him are the leaders of the dominant faction of his party.

Judge Stockslager has never figured as a pronounced opponent of the church. He has been on the bench since the issue became acute, and has not been forced to take a stand. But he has told his party friends that he favors making the Mormon issue the paramount one of the campaign; that he stands with his party on the question and that, if elected governor, his influence will be exerted toward carrying out the party platform.

By nominating Stockslager, and thus deriding Gooding of the "law and order" issue, the Idaho Democrats figure that Mormonism will be the paramount issue of the campaign, and the chief topic of campaign discussion. They figure that they will force Gooding into the open as a defender of the church in politics and that the Gentile vote in large measure will come to them; and they figure that they have picked a winner for governor.
