BOTH AMERICANS ARE WHIPPED

Yanks Are Now Out of It in Struggle for the Dwight Davis Cup.

London, June 18.—Those who anticipated a tame finish of the Dwight F. Davis international tennis cup matches at Wimbledon today were pleasantly surprised, the outstanding singles, S. H. Smith against Holcombe Ward and H. L. Dougherty against R. D. Little, providing some of the best play of the tournament.

Smith played a splendid game, and it was only after securing the first two sets, 6-1, 6-0, that he gave Ward an opportunity of showing his skill. The American had been able to win only the sixth game of the first set, but when he entered on the second set, he showed all his old dash. Smith, however, played a cool and resourceful game, winning a hard set by 6-4.

POST-MORTEM OVER SYSSOBY

Famous Runner Dies of Blood Poisoning Due From Badly Bruised Leg.

New York, June 18.—James R. Keene, owner of Syssoby which died yesterday, was deeply grieved at the loss of his great race horse. He ordered a post-mortem examination and the physicians settled conclusively that the horse did not die of the skin disease for which he had been treated for several months.

The skin affection had been the remote cause, it is surmised, for the horse had stamped in his stall to express his dislike for the itching of the skin. The blood poisoning which caused death originated in a badly bruised frog of the right fore foot.

NO FOOTBALL SAYS "NICK"

Columbia University Has Abolished Game—No Further Action at Present.

New York, June 18.—President Nicholas Murray Butler of Columbia university settled in a statement issued yesterday all doubts as to the status of football in the nation. He said: "The committee on athletics of the university has already separated for the summer recess, it is not possible to take any further action in regard to athletic matters before the autumn, and the whole matter remains exactly as it has been for six months."
