TAKE UP GLASMANN CASE

Republican State Committeemen Confer With Would-Be Ogden Postmaster.

William Spry, chairman of the state Republican committee, William M. McCrea, secretary of the committee, and Edward H. Callister, internal revenue collector, were in Ogden yesterday in connection with the Ogden postmaster's case. They were very active concerning their mission and held a lengthy conference with William Glasmann. It is understood that the charges against Glasmann filed in Washington had much to do with the trip to this city.

VICTIM OF JEALOUSY.

Goldie Harnish, Held for a Day, Is Given Liberty.

Goldie Harnish, not yet 15 years of age, en route from Butte to Sylvan Grove, Kan., was detained at Ogden during Tuesday night at the request of the chief of police of Butte. Yesterday the case developed into one of spite work and jealousy on the part of the girl's half-sisters and she was permitted to resume her journey. From the young woman's story, her parents are dead, and she was raised by Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Hoyt of Sylvan Grove, Kan. She was made sole heir to the Hoyt estate. About a year ago when the Hoyts were about to adopt her, two half-sisters, residing in Butte induced her to go to that place. The adoption papers were sent to Butte from Kansas, but fell into the hands of the half-sisters, who refused to turn them over to the girl. She received a letter from her foster parents, in which was enclosed a ticket from Butte to Sylvan Grove. From the treatment she received at the hands of relatives at Butte she knew they would object to her leaving so on Tuesday evening she left her place of employment and boarded a train for the east. The chief of police at Butte was appealed to, and word was sent out for her apprehension. The whole trouble seems to have arisen from the fact that Miss Harnish was made heir to the Hoyt estate which created a jealousy on the part of her sisters, both of whom are following the stage for a livelihood.

Miss Bessie Severn and W. N. Petterson surprised their friends yesterday by getting married. Not until after the knot was tied did any of their friends know anything of their intention. Salt Lake Painter Charged With Attempt to Murder.

Lauritz Farse, the Salt Lake painter, was arraigned in the municipal court yesterday forenoon on a charge of assault with intent to commit murder on the person of Ora S. Page on June 24, in Ogden canyon. Attorney M. D. Lessinger appeared for Farse. Judge J. D. Murphy fixed the bail at \$1,500, in default of which the prisoner was remanded in the custody of the sheriff. The date for the preliminary hearing will be fixed on Monday.

OLD MAN IS SLUGGED.

Holdups Knock Down and Rob James Wardman, Aged 70.

James Wardman, 70 years of age, was held up and robbed late Tuesday night by two thugs near Twenty-third street and Wall avenue. Wardman was on his way to his home, 2130 Sherburne avenue, when he was assaulted. A blow on the head which dazed the old man was the first intimation that he and that he had been picked as a victim for the hold-up. The highwaymen rifled his pockets and took all the money he had on his person. Mr. Wardman staggered to his home, where he was cared for. The matter was reported to the police yesterday morning.

Mrs. John Henry Dies.

Mrs. John Henry, wife of the catcher of the Ogden State league baseball team, died at her home here yesterday forenoon after a protracted illness. Bright's disease. Mrs. Henry came to Ogden five years ago and was married here. She was born in Gridley, Cal., October 22, 1818. The remains will be taken to California Friday for interment.

Ogden Briefs.

William Coffin, an employe in the Southern Pacific shops, lost the third finger of the left hand by being caught in the machinery yesterday afternoon and crushed so badly that it had to be amputated.

Chief of Police Browning has issued instructions to all propertyholders that all cottonwood shade trees within the limits of the city must be removed at once. If this is not done, the city will do the work and tax the propertyholders.

On account of a slight rainstorm coming on shortly before 8 o'clock last evening the bicycle races at Glenwood saucer track were called off. A large crowd attended the dance and musical programme given by the Elks at the Glenwood park pavilion.

Funeral services will be held over the remains of Mrs. Ford Henry at 4 o'clock this afternoon from the Ritchey undertaking parlors. The members of lodge 774, Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, have been requested to attend. The remains will be shipped to California tomorrow morning.

A washout is reported to have occurred near Golconda, Nev., on the main line of the Southern Pacific late Tuesday night. It is stated that several hundred feet of track were washed away, and as a result all trains from the west are from three to five hours late in arriving here. This accident is said to have occurred near the same place where a cloudburst washed out a large portion of the trackbed and killed several sheepherders about a month ago.

BOUND TO BEAT TOUGH OLD GANG

Pennsylvania Democrats Endorse Lincoln Party Nominee for Governor.

W. J. BRYAN IS COMMENDED

FIGHT WILL BE MADE ON STATE ISSUES.

Harrisburg, Pa., June 27.—The Democratic state convention today nominated the following ticket:

Governor—Lewis Emery, jr., of Bradford, the Lincoln party nominee.

Lieutenant governor—Jere S. Black of York.

Auditor general—William T. Cressy, the prohibition nominee.

Secretary of internal affairs—John J. Green of Philadelphia.

The platform deals entirely with state issues, except one plank, which commends William J. Bryan. The convention did not go on record in favor of Bryan's nomination for president.

Emery was the choice of the delegates who favor fusion with the Lincoln party on a state ticket. He was nominated on the first ballot by a vote of 231 to 69 for Arthur G. Dewalt of Lehigh county.

Mr. Black, the nominee for second place, is a grandson of the late Judge Jere S. Black, attorney general of President Buchanan's cabinet, and a son of the late Chauncey F. Black, lieutenant governor of Pennsylvania.

Mr. Cressy is the Democratic leader of the house of representatives and was nominated for auditor general by the recent prohibition convention.

The Platform.

"The Democratic party in Pennsylvania by its representatives in convention assembled declares:

"That public questions relating only to the future government and affecting solely the election of representatives in congress appropriately belong for determination to the voters of the several congressional districts.

"We congratulate the people of Pennsylvania upon the pretended conversion of the Republican organization of our state to sound and moral political doctrines.

While the sincerity of this eleventh hour repentance may well be doubted it may at least be accepted as that tribute which hypocrisy always pays to virtue.

"All important reforms the Republican platform professes now have been consistently declared for and supported by the Democracy of the state for many years.

"We therefore repeat the declaration of our aims and purposes and we again affirm that we stand as ever for the rule of the people, in county, state and nation as against the federated tyranny of organized greed and corrupt political and commercial manipulators."

The platform urges improved election laws; favors a complete and rigid regulation of all corporations engaged in public service; the prohibition of transportation by companies engaged in the mining of coal and other minerals, or the manufacture of any commodities in the transportation of which they are engaged as common carriers; denounces the giving of rebates, favors such change in the food laws "as will insure the protection of public health," and favors a "strict prohibition by civil and criminal enactment of all contributions by corporations to parties, organizations, committees or individuals for political purposes."

EGGS ARE FIVE CENTS HIGHER

California Potatoes, Lemons and Tomatoes Are the Features of the Local Market.

Eggs, which have sold at 20 cents in the local markets for some time, took an upward flight to 25 cents yesterday. Utah hens have not been doing their duty of late and the supply is not equal to the demand.

A carload of California potatoes arrived yesterday. They were sold wholesale at \$2.25 per hundredweight. A car of lemons also arrived, and as the demand for that fruit has been strong they found a ready market at the old price of 35 and 37 per crate.

Tomatoes have declined slightly in price and the best quality can now be bought at two pounds for 25 cents. Cantaloupes of the finest quality are to be had at 10 cents each.
