

COUNCILMEN TO HOLD THEIR JOBS

Smoot Crowd Unable to Find Grounds to Bring Suits to Oust Them.

LAWYERS TURN DOWN PLAN

ONLY A BARE CHANCE TO "GET" TWO MEMBERS OF BODY.

The Smoot machine, which announced loudly a few weeks ago that it proposed to oust five Salt Lake City councilmen for accepting illegal fees and thus parallel in Salt Lake the Ogden scandal, has apparently abandoned the attempt after taking legal advice.

The charge which it was proposed to lodge against the councilmen was that they had accepted extra compensation for serving on the board to equalize water rates. The five men mentioned were A. J. Davis and L. D. Martin, "Americans"; F. S. Fernstrom and W. J. Thudennan, Democrats; and J. W. Freese, Republican.

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Lawyers Frown on Scheme. When the Smoot machine consulted lawyers, it was found that the law under which they sought to bring action against the five councilmen specifically provided that an officer can be removed for receiving illegal fees only during the term of which he was elected.

Are up a Stump. The machine leaders, therefore, are up a stump. They admit that there isn't the slightest chance to make a prosecution "stick" against Fernstrom, Thudennan and Martin.

Callister Hatched Scheme. The plan to oust the councilmen, it is said, was hatched by Internal Revenue Collector E. H. Callister, himself a former member of the council.

Callister is the chief lieutenant of Senator Smoot, and, it is said, was insistent that action be instituted until lawyers told him positively that there was a chance to "get" only two councilmen at the outside, and that it was most decidedly a slim chance with every prospect of ignominious failure.



Table showing sales records for various shoe companies from 1902 to 1906. Includes Hamilton-Brown Shoe Co., Roberts, Johnson & Rand Shoe Co., etc.
