

MULVEY IS TOLD OF HIS CENSURE

City Recorder Informs Him of Council's Belief That He is a "Bum" Actor.

HAS MORETON'S SYMPATHY CABBAGE HEADS THREATENED BY ENVIOUS COLLEAGUES.

Councilman Martin E. Mulvey was yesterday notified formally by City Recorder J. E. Moreton of the action of the council Monday night in censuring him for appearing in "The Old Bedstead," which is to be presented by the Salt Lake Press club at the Salt Lake theatre to-night.

Mr. Moreton's letter follows: My Dear Mr. Mulvey: In your absence from the council meeting Monday evening the eight vicious and ill-informed councilmen who happened to be present took it upon themselves to pass a certain resolution (which I describe) reflecting in some degree upon your size and good name, as a member of their honorable body from the Fifth precinct, because you have for once in your life fallen by the wayside and have been influenced by a certain disreputable element in our community called the Press club to take an unknown part in "The Old Bedstead," which is to be exhibited to public view on Thursday evening at a certain theatre in this city.

"Feeling personally aggrieved at the uncalled-for attitude of the bunch of councilmen who, it appears, knew you would be absent at last night's meeting although I warned you during the afternoon that you would quite likely be needed to appear on your own to pass the enclosed resolution.

Black is Responsible. "To further assure you of my friendship and good wishes, notwithstanding what the reflections and imputations were in this resolution, I beg to advise you that I called the roll of the seven members who were present, yet one Tom Black, who happened to be promoted to the president's chair for the evening, declared that the resolution was adopted in the face of the fact that I announced that seven members of this council were absent. I take it my duty to inform you of this proceeding and to further assure you that my sympathies are with the heavyweights of this body at all times.

"Now, I trust you will keep this letter in confidence and govern your conduct accordingly when you appear on the stage in full view of those eight men, who claim to represent Salt Lake City's best interests, because I really overheard certain people inquiring of one Crabtree the price of cabbage heads. Now, I don't claim it is the city's business what the price of cabbage is quoted at.

Will Give Him a Bouquet. "It has also been intimated that you are to appear on the stage with a paper collar and a bright red silk girdle as your only wearing apparel. Never mind. This will certainly attract attention and as soon as this fact became known a subscription list was started in your behalf, not only to increase your salary as councilman, but to show our appreciation at the proper time by presenting you a beautiful bouquet. I trust you will personally see to it that there will be about twenty seats reserved in the front row so that your friends can shout and be near you with applause and other complimentary remarks. "Believe me to be your confidential friend."

FRYE GETTING UNTANGLED.

Chicago Bigamist Will Be Released by First Wife. Chicago, Sept. 5.—C. H. Frye, who was arrested on a charge of bigamy upon his return to Chicago recently after an absence of thirty-one years, was released from custody today on bonds signed by Mrs. Clara A. Goddard, whom Frye married in South Dakota under the name of Goddard. A suit for divorce, filed by Mrs. Frye, the legal wife, is pending in the circuit court, and it was upon the promise of Frye to marry Mrs. Goddard as soon as he was freed from his first alliance that Frye was given his liberty. Mrs. Goddard, accompanied by her 19-year-old daughter, Jessie, came to Chicago from California and revealed the dual life of Frye since he met her in Spencer, Ia., in 1877.

POLICE FORCE REMOVED.

Tonopah, Nev., Sept. 5.—The county commissioners last night passed resolutions removing the whole police force from office. It was stated that this was for the interests of the town. The duties of the police were turned over to the sheriff. The action arose from many grave complaints regarding the conduct of the police.

LINEMAN MEETS DEATH.

Sacramento, Cal., Sept. 5.—Jerry Corcoran, a lineman, 29 years of age, in the employ of the telephone company, was electrocuted in midair this morning. He was engaged in removing old wires from poles when he cut into a live wire and made a contact with a cable carrying 2,000 volts. He was instantly killed.

FAKE WRESTLERS MAKE BIG HAUL

Work the Old Sure Thing Gag and Many Suckers Are Caught. (Special to The Herald.) Ogden, Sept. 5.—A story was made public here yesterday exposing one of the largest confidence games ever worked in the west. This game has been carried on at Seattle and along the coast since last December. It is claimed that prominent men there and elsewhere in the northwest have been victimized to the extent of \$125,000. Among the alleged victims are Charles Cunningham of Pendleton, Ore., \$25,000; W. T. Owen, Anaconda, Mont., \$15,000; Thomas Norton, Sacramento, \$10,000; Harry Lang, San Francisco, \$5,000; Dr. G. E. Blackburn, Butte, \$3,000, and many others. Among the latter and one of the latest victims is Louis Saville of Ogden, whose purse was tapped for \$50,000.

The game was fake wrestling and fighting. The victims were induced to put their money on what they thought was a sure thing and then would be "given the double cross." For the most part the bouts were pulled off in an obscure arena on the shore of Lake Washington. John Willie, the wrestler, was one of the chief figures in the game, but when he figured that he could dump the Ogden sports on the wrestling match Monday night he labored for his own downfall. For this reason, when Willie's name was mentioned it was rejected and the information given out that the police were wise to the confidence game caused Willie to leave Ogden for other parts.

Saville Relates His Experience. Saville's experience as related here is to the effect that he was approached by some of those in the game and informed that there was a chance to make a bunch of money on the coast "dead easy," that there was a wrestler up there whom Willie could throw who was backed by a lot of millionaires. Saville was invited to go and see the match, but it was not to cost him a cent. He was further told if he cared to venture there would be a piece of money in it for him. Willie was to act as pilot and pay the expenses of the going trip. When they landed in Seattle he was introduced to the so-called millionaires about between their world-beater and Willie was arranged. Some one in the party showed a few thousand dollars and asked him to lay it on Willie. This was repeated several times until there was about \$40,000 bet on the match including the \$5,000 belonging to Saville.

Held in Obscure Place. The match was pulled off at the obscure arena. Willie secured the first fall in short order and lost the next two in a much shorter time. Likewise the money placed on him went. One of the men who had been dealing out the money to Saville to bet then came up with another man and told Saville that the money he had used was the same money used over and over again. He said he feared exposure and as he was a stakeholder he agreed to meet at Portland and divide the whole purse. Saville and a man named McCoy started for Portland and during the night McCoy disappeared and Saville arrived in Portland only to learn that he was hounded and they had adopted the means of getting him out of Seattle. The names of the instigators of the fights and bouts are Russell B. Harriman, alias Russ Barrett; F. W. Brown, an eastern confidence man, and Mathew Rier, a well-known horseman. Ogden and Salt Lake police were notified of the game and had arranged to arrest the entire gang had they arrived and attempted to work their game in either city. The cat got out of the bag, however, and they have kept away from this section.

It was learned yesterday from Chief of Police Sheets that the McCoy referred to was none other than Ed McCoy, of Garrison, Colo. McCoy was a fighter some time ago and came to Salt Lake to fight Denver Ed Smith five years ago. Chief of Police Sheets acknowledged that he was looking for Willie.

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ASSAULTED UNDER GROUND

J. B. Evans and F. A. Sharp Used Up by Hannifan Brothers in Little Chief Mine, Eureka. (Special to The Herald.) Eureka, Sept. 5.—J. B. Evans, superintendent of the Snowflake mine, and F. A. Sharp, a well-known citizen of Eureka, were assaulted this evening in the Little Chief or Snowflake mines. Mr. Evans wanted to go down through the Snowflake workings to inspect the ground where the two mines connect, and not wishing to go alone invited Mr. Sharp to accompany him. Together they were lowered by Engineer Joe Allen to the 700-foot level of the latter. They went as far as the Little Chief shaft and climbed down 200 feet. On this level there is a raise of 100 or 200 feet connecting the Little Chief at this point with the Snowflake in which the ladders were in bad condition. This fact necessitated the two men going down by the Little Chief shaft. Mr. Sharp drew Mr. Evans' attention to the fact that this raise marked the boundary line between the two mines, and when they had gone in about seven feet further three men, Superintendent Joe Hannifan of the Little Chief and his brothers, Con J. and James, jumped out of the darkness and commanded Messrs. Evans and Sharp to stop where they were. Then the Hannifans, Mr. Sharp and afterward Mr. Sharp. They then took the candle and candlesticks from the two men and marched them back to the Little Chief shaft and commanded them to jump into the bucket. They did this quickly and were accompanied to the top by Superintendent Hannifan and his brother Con. They were commanded to march down town, where they were told they would be turned over to the sheriff. Upon their arrival in town, however, nothing was done, and Mr. Sharp, who had received a painful injury to his right cheek, was attended by Dr. J. Hensel.

Mr. Sharp, who owns about 10,000 shares in the Little Chief, does not understand why he was made the object of this attack. Mr. Evans, it is presumed, was not overstepping his duty in going to the workings of the mine in which he is superintendent through the Little Chief. Work in the Little Chief has been going on under considerable mysterious circumstances days, and the attack upon the two men is thought to have been an effort to keep certain developments unknown.
