TWO HARD GAMES FOR UTAH TEAM

Colorado College Offers Contest on Saturday and Denver U. Week Later.

Manager J. C. Brown of the university football team received a proposition from Colorado Springs yesterday which says that they will take the university team there for a game this coming Saturday and let them remain there a week and then go to Denver for their game with Denver university the Saturday following. The matter was brought before the athletic council yesterday afternoon, but the council adjourned before deciding definitely on the proposition. They will hold a meeting today and should they decide on it, it will be put before the faculty to receive final sanction.

"If the boys go they will take their books along and continue their studies at the Colorado school during the week, so that they will not be set back in their scholastic work. Every night they will try to win against the Colorado college in scrimmage, which will be beneficial to both teams. The scheme would prove a great saving to the team financially, as games are scheduled with both teams and the cost of making two trips would be heavy.

Rumors have been circulated that Boulder was engineering the scheme to get a line on Utah's plays. This, however, is improbable, as Boulder and Colorado Springs are many miles apart, and Colorado college is as much a rival to Boulder as Utah is.

The team held another spirited practice yesterday afternoon and did some good scrimmage work against the scrubs. The scrubs are getting into fine form for their game with Ogden High school at Ogden next Saturday. All Hallows will line up against the U team this afternoon for scrimmage practice.

PICKED BULLET OUT OF SHIRT

One Bookmaker Takes Shot at Another at Close Range—No Damage Done.

Louisville, Oct. 8.—Just before the horses went to the post for the sixth race today bookmaker Sam Stephens kicked Ed Alvey, a local bookmaker, under the chin. Alvey whipped out his pistol and fired at Stephens at close range. The bullet cut Stephens' shirt over his stomach and lodged in the clothing of Bob Winslow, Stephens' cashier. Winslow picked the bullet out of his undershirt, where it had lodged against the skin of his abdomen. He was uninjured save for a big blue bruise. SALT LAKE HORSE BREEDERS' SERIES

Dr. Frasse Wins 2:12 Trot at Lexington—Was Formerly Owned by J. T. Richards.

Dr. Frasse, formerly owned by J. T. Richards of this city, made a big killing at the Lexington meeting yesterday, when he won the 2:12 class trot after going seven heats. Dr. Frasse is well known to local turfmen as one of the best trotters that ever worked on a Salt Lake track. He was owned by Richards this horse beat every other trotter in the intermountain country and holds the Utah state record for one mile in 4:30 and in 2:15 made at the state fair grounds and also the half-mile competition in 1:06, made on the same track.

MUCH INTEREST IN MURDER CASE

Trial of Dr. Frank Brouwer, Who Is Charged With Killing His Wife.

Chicago, Oct. 8.—Ideal baseball weather is predicted for tomorrow, and tonight the national game of America played is anxiously waiting for the call of time tomorrow at 2:30 o'clock, when the Chicago National League Americans will meet in the first game of a series of seven for the world's championship. Both teams are in excellent condition for the struggle and both are confident of victory. The pitchers on both teams are in grand form, and both managers, Chance and Ewing, wish to see their own pitcher triumph. It is declared that the losing team would have no excuses for their defeat except that the best ball players had won. As to who would pitch the first game neither manager is able to announce tonight with any degree of certainty. Chance said he hoped Brown would be the selection, while Jones said the man who showed the best in the workout would be the one selected to pitch the west siders.

BODY OF WOMAN EXHUMED

TRACES OF ARSENIC FOUND IN STOMACH.

Tom River, N. J., Oct. 8.—The trial of Dr. Frank Brouwer, charged with the murder of his wife, was on the court calendar here today. Mrs. Brouwer died in September, 1905, after an illness that was diagnosed at first by her husband as cholera morbus. Dr. H. M. Gate signed a death certificate setting forth that Mrs. Brouwer died of Bright's disease. Soon after the funeral rumors began to spread that there was something suspicious about Mrs. Brouwer's death. There had been quarrels between the couple over the administration of Mrs. Brouwer's parents' estate. It also was rumored that Mrs. Brouwer had been jealous of one of the doctor's women patients.

WORLD'S RECORD EQUALLED

Ironides Takes Jerome Handicap in Fast Time at Belmont Park.

New York, Oct. 8.—Ironides, at 5 to 2, won the Jerome handicap for 3-year-olds, the mile and five-sixteenths, at Belmont park today, and, in winning, the Meddler colt equalled the world's record for the distance by stepping it in 2:10 3-5.

Bedouin won the stakes in the same time last year. Good Luck, the favorite, was second, and Running Water was third. In the colts' half of the \$10,000 Matron stakes, six furlongs straightway, Ballot, the 9 to 20 favorite, scored an easy victory. He took command early and won by one and a half lengths. Results:

Present Title Holder Makes Low Score in Qualifying Round.

West Newton, Mass., Oct. 8.—The honors in the qualifying round, which opened the twelfth national women's golf championship at the Braeburn Country club today, rested on the shoulders of Miss Pauline Mackay of the Oakley Country club of Boston and the present titleholder. Her score of 87 for the eighteen holes was the best card of the section, which were headed in. Miss Frances C. Osgood of the Country club, Boston, made an 88, the only other score under 90. The remainder of the field of 322 players who qualified for the first round of match play tomorrow had to make 105 or better in the qualifying round.

The card of Mrs. G. W. Roope of Denver, one of the thirty-two, was: Out, 43; in, 42. Total, 85. Mrs. Roope is in the eighth place.
