MORE ON ELY'S ORE FORMATION

Extract From Report That Deals With Limestone Fringes of Porphyry Intrusion.

RICH ORE BODIES IN LIME

OPINION OF HOW MINERAL WAS DEPOSITED.

The description of the copper-bearing porphyries of the Ely camp and the manner in which the enrichment of the material occurred, by Colonel E. A. Wall, and published on the 7th of the present month, has been read with a great deal of interest, particularly by mining engineers and men of the camp owning properties. Since then regret has been expressed that he did not go deeper into the subject and express his opinion on the country flanking the porphyry deposits. Colonel Wall did not spend much time in the camp and was, therefore, unable to go into great detail, a fact that he regretted as much as any one. He was preparing for a trip east when his article was prepared, and he did not even find time to make a cross-section sketch, explanatory of the manner in which the country had been disturbed by the porphyry intrusion. He wanted to do that, and he wanted to say something about the marginal possibilities of the main deposit, but he was forced to omit it.

F. S. Pheby, the Ely banker, now in the city, who with others owns the Nevada Northern group of claims two miles westerly from the town of Ely, and north of the Chairman, has an expert report upon his property that deals in some detail with the geological conditions that people are inquiring about and, with his permission, The Herald quotes from that expert report as follows:

Formation of Ore Bodies.

"Two general processes have operated to form the ores on the north side of Robinson canyon: (1) metasomatic alteration, (replacement) including pyritic mineralization (deposition of chalcocite, a sulphide of copper and iron), and (2) oxidation of such pyrite masses, and its attendant phenomena of transportation of the copper content by percolating waters and the deposition of such copper to enrich other and lower portions of the same ore body. Most replacement ore bodies invariably show these two processes to have been at work and to be still in operation, and by this wonderful way of nature, many low-grade pyrite ore bodies are gradually transformed into bodies of commercial ore. Attendant upon the deposition of the ore bodies, was the silicification of some considerable limestone, generally along the foot wall or lower side.

"Originally the ore bodies were composed of lean iron pyrite and some chalcocite, and by leaching and concentration of a large mass of pyrite, leaving as a residual the oxidized iron, the secondarily enriched ore bodies are formed; changed by superficial alteration into carbonates in their upper portion and related to the sulphides in the underlying portions by black sulphides with additional gold and silver values. However, there is sufficient evidence of copper in the present surface croppings to make it certain these bodies carried copper. Eventually the sulphide ore bodies became oxidized, and descending surface waters leached the copper contained and redeposited it at greater depths, therefore the leaving, the present iron caps or gossams.

Ore in Ruth Limestone

"The most promising gossams of a rusty brown limonite seem to be restricted to a zone several hundred feet wide, and the limestone has been subjected to considerable fissuring and intrusion by irregular masses of igneous rock, taking the form of sills or dykes. The ore bodies seem to be restricted to the thick, massive Ruth limestone on the north of Robinson canyon, the canyon probably being the result of erosion along an extensive fault plane.

"Surface study shows that these ore bodies are not altogether confined to a single horizon, but are known to pass above the intrusive, but have formed at various levels to the top of the divide. They are something distinct from the porphyry ore bodies that are of such magnitude and so well known on the Ely district. However, they resemble very strongly the ore bodies of Bisbee, Clifton, Morenci and Globe. No work has been done to prove them as extensive as the ore bodies of these great camps just enumerated, but in character of disposition and occurrence they are identical, being a replacement of the limestone near an intrusive dyke. Particularly are they like the ore bodies of Bisbee.

Ores Follow Bedding Planes.

"The very irregular tabular or lenticular masses of ore follow fissures and bedding planes in the enclosing limestones. The fissuring and fracturing of the limestone is observed to be a factor in the mineralization, and the limestones so fissured and fractured seem to have permitted the more ready circulation of mineralizing heated aqueous solutions. One ore body on the Blue claim of the Nevada Northern Copper company distinctly shows all the stratification and peculiar curvy

structure of the limestone, which has been entirely replaced by mineral. "What development has been done shows the copper shoots to be flat, irregular beds of lenticular shape, but more generally irregular replacements along zones of fracture and bedding, some being well defined in their boundaries, while others are vague and indefinite.

"Lawson says the general ground water level of the Robinson mining district is difficult to define. As in most semi-arid regions, it lies comparatively deep, especially in the limestones, more than in the porphyry, a less shattered and non-impermeable rock, while most of the clippings above the water level have been transformed into 'oxidized ores.' The movement of the oxidizing solutions has been generally downward, but in some secondarily enriched ore bodies, this movement may be lateral and in some cases, even upward. Thus it appears in the case of the ore bodies of the Nevada Northern, the oxidizing solutions, guided by fissures, bedding planes and relatively porous masses of rock or ore, have generally moved downward."

WANT THEIR MINE BACK.

Chairman Stockholders Are After the Nevada Con. Company.

Much interest has been aroused by new legal developments in the past week in the litigation which has been pending during the summer between the stockholders of the Chairman Mining company of Ely, Nev., in the suit to regain possession of the mining property of which a sale has been attempted to the Nevada Consolidated Copper company. During the past week a commission has been busy at Ely taking testimony from certain mining experts and others regarding the valuation of the property, to be used in a suit now pending in the supreme court, state of New York, brought by C. W. Mooers and others against the Nevada Consolidated in March last.

During the past week, however, the Chairman stockholders sprung a surprise on the Nevada Consolidated by bringing a suit in Washoe county, Nevada, for possession of the property, and accounting of moneys collected, and a claim for damages amounting to \$20,000. At the same time Justice Clegg granted the petition for the appointment of a receiver to take possession of the property while the action is pending. He appointed Dr. R. H. Richardson of Ely, who was given possession on Thursday. The receiver will have the management of the electric power plant belonging to the plaintiff company, which furnishes the light for the town of Ely and power for the surrounding mines, as well as the management and control of the telephone line from Ely to Eureka, the building lots in the town of Ely and the large mining property known as the Chairman mine, on which a 200-ton cyanide plant was erected during 1901 and 1902.

The Nevada Consolidated, it is claimed, fraudulently took possession of the property in March, 1906, under the terms of an alleged sale made by the committee of the stockholders and their attorneys, whom the stockholders claim were fraudulently interested with the buyer to deliver the property to the alleged grossly inadequate sum of \$100,000.

It was brought out at the taking of the testimony that mining operators in Ely and elsewhere consider the total value of the property to range from \$250,000 to \$500,000, even under a forced sale, the electric light plant alone being capable of earning at least \$20,000 per year.

Fred D. Smith, formerly assistant manager of the property, and engineer in charge of the construction of the mill, has charge of the litigation for the stockholders. He says that although

an injunction was granted in March by the supreme court of the state of New York to restrain the Nevada Consolidated from altering, removing, or destroying any of the property, yet not less than \$10,000 worth of machinery has been removed from the mill and the property deliberately injured and allowed to deteriorate to the extent of warranting his company to bring damage suit in the sum of \$50,000.

NORTH TINTIC OPENING UP.

New Company Has Fine Ground—Fifteen Mines Have Ore.

George H. Nicholas, one of the original owners of the great group of mines in the North Tintic district and upon which the Nicholas-Tintic Mining company was organized during the week ending yesterday. He and his brother, Theodore, had owned and held the ground under trying circumstances for many years, and he is naturally glad to see the company such men as John Y. Smith, the Lehi banker, and prominent Salt Lake operators to go into the company formed to fully develop the ground.

Mr. Nicholas stated yesterday that from surface workings they had shipped over 100 tons of ore that had sold for better than \$50 a ton in the local market. They had then undertaken to run a tunnel to the ore-bearing strata at a greater depth, but the ground had been exceedingly hard and they had had a hard time making headway without machinery and by being compelled to do the work at odd times when it was possible for them to leave their positions and spend their time at the mine, the tunnel has not been driven 150 feet. At 140 feet an open fissure was encountered and ten feet farther they cut a six-saggy vein which they first thought was the ledge for which they were driving. A short time ago they were driving a tunnel and surveyed with the result that they now are convinced that they will have to drive the tunnel possibly twenty feet farther to reach the vein they are after. The vein just cut carries a seam of ore that undoubtedly leads into the main ledge, and the expectation is that the vein is finally reached, which it will be shortly, the proposition will at once become self-sustaining.

The ground is located about two miles north of the Beck Tunnel and Colorado properties of Uncle Jesse Knight, and about the distance east of the famous Scranton, a mine that is shipping an average of nearly a carload of ore a day and which, among other things, has proven that the veins in North Tintic go down.

Mr. Nicholas says that there are in the neighborhood of fifteen properties in the North Tintic district which are now taking out more or less ore and, without wishing to be accused of being a promoter, his own company's ground, he declares that that end of the mine is going to do so well during the next year or two that the mining world will be compelled to stop and take notice.

FROM SEVEN TROUGHS.

Salt Lake Expert Returns From Trip of Inspection.

S. M. Levy, field expert of the National Development company, returned yesterday morning from a trip of inspection to the famous Seven Troughs district, about twenty-five miles northeast of Lovelock, in Humboldt county, Nevada. He went there to size up different propositions and to check up on reports that had been coming from the front by John Cleghorn, of this city, shows a fine ledge and veins are being taken at work upon it. It is a silver property and the ores are said to carry high values in that metal. Recently the ledge by Mr. Levy, but when seen during the afternoon, he had not got returns from the assayer, so he was unable to say how the ore would run. Adjoining the Cleghorn group is the Fairview property into which Jesse Knight and Lafayette Holbrook have been investing. Talks Cleghorn, it is a straight gold proposition, but, other than by report, which is extremely favorable, Mr. Levy said he knew nothing of the value of the ground or the ore it was said to contain.

There is considerable doing in the district and the town of Verden, which is nearer the Cleghorn property than Seven Troughs, boasts a saloon, rooming house, restaurant, etc., and is growing rapidly, notwithstanding the fact that Seven Troughs has the water, while the newer town has to haul its supply.

BLACK ROCK COPPER.

Another Shoot of Rich Ore Is Tapped on 200 Level.

Copper ore that looks as though it would easily carry 30 to 40 per cent of the red metal in addition to any silver and gold values, was brought up from the Black Rock company's property yesterday morning. The ore appears in the property as a new strike, at that. Recently the shaft was finished to the 200-foot level, and a drift was started south in the ledge. But a short distance was run when a body of high-grade ore was encountered. The air got bad and a ventilating fan and the connecting piping were put in. Then work was resumed.

As soon as it was possible to do so, Manager James began to prove up his Beaver county lode by sending a drift to the north, while work was continuing in the south drift, as usual. He has now cut a rich shoot of ore in that direction and everything looks as though the shaft would prove up even better than in the south ground, where he considered he had enough rich ore to use in the mill. The making of a big mine, the Black Rock property, while incorporated, is controlled and almost exclusively owned by Mr. James and Willard F. Snyder.

ORE FROM CALIENTE.

Provo Men Bring Shipment From Ground Owned by Them.

Provo, Oct. 20.—Ellis Maxfield and William Brinton have returned from southern Nevada, where they have been mining this summer. They brought with them a shipment of ore from some claims located by them near Caliente, which they will have sampled at the Murray smelter. The rock shows that it is rich in copper, lead and silver, although no assay has been obtained of the samples brought. The owners have a three-foot vein of this ore.

Donald Rawstorn, agent of the American Asphaltum & Rubber company, of Chicago, who has secured a number of asphaltum claims for his company near Tucker, is preparing to ship rock asphaltum, and is advertising for teams to haul the material from the mine to the railroad at Tucker.

Mining Notes.

L. A. Jeffs left last night to make an examination of property at Ely, Nev.

Four carloads of ore from AHA, two from Tintic, two from Stockton and one from Ophir, were reported at the Pioche sampler yesterday.

The Success Mining company has sold its single claim in the Tintic district to the Colorado Mining company for 75,000 shares of stock in the latter corporation.

Herman Barnett returned from the Cedar company's property in Beaver county yesterday morning. He said that teams had begun to haul ore and that the initial consignment would reach here during the week, the time depending on the number of teams employed. Two had started and two other outfits had promised to haul.

A message from the superintendent of the Nevada-Fairview yesterday brought the information that a sample of ore from the bottom of the shaft assayed \$238 per ton, while an average sample of the mass
