SEASON CLOSURE ON THANKSGIVING

Utah Unable to Arrange Game With Colorado School of Mines.

MEET AGGIES IN FINAL

EVERY EFFORT TO OBTAIN POST-SEASON GAMES FAILS.

The game Thursday with the Logan Aggies will no doubt be the last game of the season for Utah's champion team, and after that contest the team will disband for the season. Every effort to obtain post-season games has failed. The game with the Colorado School of Mines, which is apparently the champion aggregation of Colorado, is off, as the Miners refuse to play. This gives Utah no chance to claim the intermountain championship, which, it is believed, could be won. The principal excuse the Miners assign for refusing a game is that the faculty will not allow a post-season game, though arrangements are being made for a contest between the Miners and Colorado college to play off a tie.

So far it is impossible to get a trip to the coast. Although the trip has not been called off, nothing definite can be assured. Coach Maddock refused the offer to play the team being organized in Butte. The team mentioned has no record and nothing genuine could be assured of the people in coming to such a game.

It is a matter of regret that the team must disband without the opportunity to contest with the Colorado Miners for the championship. Every possible proposition has been made to the Golden bunch. Manager Brown has offered to bring them here or to go there, but neither plan will suit them. Utah is anxious to get a return game with Colorado college, but the Tigers also refuse to meet Maddock's men. So, with no prospects for a game, Utah will disband after the game Thanksgiving, and the greatest team that ever represented the University will be a matter of history.

Here is President Murphy of the Chicago Cubs' letter to the count and an anxious baseball public is awaiting Boni's answer.

"Chicago, Ill., Nov. 25, 1906. Count Boni de Castellane, Chambre des Deputes, Paris, France. Our club plays championship games only in the most populous cities of the United States, the places in the circuit being New York, Chicago, Boston, Philadelphia, Brooklyn, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and St. Louis. If you join us in a brief leave of absence, it will, of course, be readily granted.

In making you this offer we desire you to accept it and we are acting in good faith. The offer is bona fide, and this letter was posted in the presence of a committee of Chicago newspaper men. If the management of the Chicago club can furnish you any information not contained herein, it will be pleased to do so. The personnel of our team would be hard to improve, many of our men being collegians. We travel in first-class style at all times and stay at the best hotels in the country.

NORTHWEST WILL NOT HAVE RUGBY

Efforts of President Wheeler to Force Game on Northern Colleges a Failure.

Rugby football has no champions among the college men of the Northwest, says C. N. McArthur in the San Francisco Chronicle.

Little attention has been paid to the English game, and the only interest that was manifested in the California-Stanford match was due to the presence of five Oregon men in the Stanford lineup. If the American game continues in popularity and is kept up to its present high standard, there will never be any demand for Rugby on the part of college professors and other athletic reformers. The English game is frowned down upon by a large majority of the football enthusiasts of this section, and any attempt to introduce it as a substitute will call forth vigorous opposition, especially from college undergraduates.

It is known that President Wheeler of the University of California is trying to induce President Campbell of the University of Oregon to adopt Rugby, but from a personal knowledge of conditions at Oregon, I know that the students of that institution will play either the American game or will abandon football altogether.

Not Impressed With Game.

There is absolutely no likelihood of Oregon playing Rugby. The same conditions exist at Washington, Idaho and other northwest institutions. During the past few years I have witnessed a number of Rugby matches in different parts of the country, and I must say that I am not at all impressed with the game. The only Rugby champions in Portland are a few old English and Canadian players—men who were brought up on the English game, just as we Americans have grown up with the game of our own country. I do not for a moment contend that our American game is perfect, but I do believe that it is an improvement over the English game, and that American ideas and American pluck will win out in the end. The American game is a solid footing that it will be above criticism and will be a fixture in our institutions of learning.

RULES LESSEN DANGER IN GAME

Resume of Season's Killed and Injured in Football is Encouraging.

Chicago, Nov. 25.—Eleven dead and one hundred and four severely injured is the record of football in the season of 1906, according to the resume of the season's accidents in the Tribune today.

These figures are compared with the casualties of 1905, when 38 players were killed and 159 severely injured, and, according to the Tribune, show that "de-bruited" football has accomplished in a large degree the object aimed at, in rendering the game less dangerous to life and limb. The decrease in casualties is especially marked among high school players. In the season of 1905 11 high school players were killed and 47 injured. In the season just closed, 7 were killed and 25 were badly injured. All the college and high school games this year were played under the new rules drawn up after the close of last season to satisfy an agitation for less dangerous football aroused by the long list of casualties in the season of 1905.

The value of the new rules is shown in the record of the big college games. This year not one fatality has occurred in the games played by the larger American colleges.

The Tribune carries interviews with a number of college presidents and coaches east and west, in which the opinion is generally expressed that the new rules have achieved the elimination of much of the brutality and danger to life and limb that characterized the game in former years, and that above all, also, it has made the game safer for high school boys.

RICKARD'S BIG OFFER TO JEFF

Says He Will Give Champion \$50,000 for Finish Fight Before Ely (Nev.) Club.

Fifty thousand dollars is the purse offered to Jim Jeffries if an opponent can be found for him to fight in Nevada. Tex Rickard, the man who pulled off the battle between Joe Gang and Battling Nelson, is the one who will hang up the purse. All he asks for is that Jim Jeffries come out of retirement and fight some good heavyweight who might make a fair showing against the big boiler-maker.

"If I could get Jeffries to fight before my club, at Ely, Nev., and find some man to meet him who would not be worse than 2 to 1 in the betting, I would be willing to give them a guaranteed purse of \$50,000. I have little hopes of any one taking up my offer, but I assure you that it is no bluff. I will put up the entire purse in cash, and give old Jeff his own way in everything. All I want is a fight in which Jim Jeffries is one of the contestants, and some good fighter who could make him hustle.

Cannot Find Contestant.

"Do you think that such a contest is a possibility at present?" Rickard was asked. "No, to tell the truth, I do not. I am only telling you the match that I would like to have for my club. I don't think there is a chance in the world to get any one to go against Jeff, but if there was all right, but we dare not consider the match. The sports in Nevada are anxious to see the big champion in action, and you could get any price you asked for seats at a contest in which he is carded to appear.
