## LARGE JAPANESE HOUSE.

Company Formed to Conduct Stores in Different Cities.

Attorney Charles R. Hollingsworth yesterday filed articles of incorporation of the Continental Supply company, with a capital stock of \$100,000. The company is a Japanese concern and is formed to do a general merchandise business. It will begin with business houses at Ogden, Pocatello, Sparks and Cheyenne. The principal stockholder is T. Komada, who conducts places of business in Yokohama, Tokio and San Francisco. The holdings of Mr. Komada consist of 291 shares, amounting to \$29,100. Next among the large stockholders is R. T. Nishimura, manager of the Cheyenne store, 150 shares, aggregating \$15,000. The balance of the \$60,000 paid up stock is distributed as follows: S. Yamasaki, manager of the Pocatello house, fifty shares, \$5,000; J. T. Niinomiya, manager for Komada & Co., of Ogden, forty shares, \$4,000; H. Senow, manager of the Japanese-American Industrial corporation, of Ogden, thirty-five shares, \$3,500; M. Akimoto, of Ogden, twenty-five shares, \$2,500. The additional \$40,000 worth of shares will be held as treasury stock, to be used for the purchase of additional stores and to open others.

## SCHOOL BOARD MEETING.

Directors From State to Be Invited to Ogden.

Preliminary steps were taken at the board of education meeting last evening for a meeting of all the school boards of the state, to be held in Ogden January 2. The finance committee reported cash on hand amounting to \$16,255.22, of which amount \$2,906.50 have been received from taxes. An estimate of the damage done by a recent windstorm to the various school buildings was placed at \$1,595.75.

## Many Cars Handled.

The greatest number of loaded and empty cars handled in twenty-four hours in the local Harbison yards was attained between 7 o'clock Thursday morning and the same hour Friday forenoon, during which time 220 loads and 107 empties were handled. The loaded cars would probably average fifty tons to the car, making the tonnage for the time specified, 23,500 tons, exclusive of the empty cars.

## Etherington Company Formed.

Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday by the Thomas Etherington and George company, with a capitalization of \$50,000, divided into shares of a par value of \$100 each. The company is incorporated to conduct a general merchandise business at West Weber, the corporation to exist for a period of 100 years. The officers of the company are: President, Thomas Etherington; vice president, James A. Etherington; secretary-treasurer, Susan A. McFarland. These, together with John N. Etherington and Mary E. McFarland, compose the board of directors.



## DICKERSON TALKS OF ELY

Lieutenant Governor-Elect of Nevada in Sala Lake to Buy Mining Machinery.

D. S. Dickerson of Ely, Nev., lieutenant governor-elect of that state, who is stopping at the Kenyon, is a politician who refuses to talk politics.

"I came here to buy machinery for some of the mines I am interested in at Ely," said Mr. Dickerson when seen last evening.

"Ely is growing wonderfully," he continued, "and is now one of the most thriving towns in the whole state. The only trouble is that there is a shortage of lumber and this makes it impossible to construct any new buildings in the immediate future. Several large structures have been planned, but it will be some time before these plans can be carried into execution."

In speaking of his campaign experiences he said that the automobile was quite generally used by politicians in touring the state and that despite the rugged character of the country proved a success.

"Nevada is one of the hardest states to campaign in, as the towns are so far apart and difficult of access," he commented. "Often I had to go into Utah and California to get train connections with points I had to visit."

Indicted Man Arrested in Portland, Oregon.

Chris Damianos, alias Anderson, who was indicted by the grand jury and charged with forgery in securing contents from registered letters, has been caught after a diligent search in Portland, Ore.
