CAUTION IS NOW THE WATCHWORD

Wall Street Speculators Inclined to Await Development of the Near Future.

STOCK PRICES WAVERED

NOTHING IN SIGHT TO CAUSE ALARM.

New York, Jan. 2.—Prices of stocks wavered uncertainly today and showed a tendency to settle back to Monday's closing level. The volume of business on the market was not explained by any speculation was not explainable by any immediate developments, these being nearly favorable. But the longer outlook was the subject of much consideration and of greatly mixed interpretation. There was a wealth of authority in evidence in the annual review on the great showing of the year just past, but there was in all of these a rather surprising unison in the note of caution mingled with even the most hopeful presages and from that ranking downward in the scale of optimism on an admission of probable early commercial recession and depression. This had its effect on stock market sentiment. The future of the money market also seemed far from clear, in spite of the prompt relaxation which was manifest today in this market and in foreign markets as well. Berlin discount rates eased in a way to give gratifying evidence of successful passing of the year and crisis in that market which was especially dreaded. London discount ran off in a pronounced way. The early 30 per cent rate for call loans here was not held long. The huge volume of clearing houses exchanges was witness to the important progress already made on Monday in disposing of the annual requirements. Conditions seemed tending quickly, therefore, towards the money relaxation which has been relied on to revive stock market activity. The modifying factor which must be reckoned with is the course of the treasury operations in the future and which were especially noted on in the January circular of the National City bank. The provision is already implied for the return of the \$100,000,000 government deposits held by the banks, half on January 20 and half on February 1, and the date was also mentioned as the period for beginning the return on the \$200,000,000 of deposits made at the banks in September last. The circular estimates that excess of government revenues over payments between now and Jan. 20 will amount to \$38,000,000 additional. The opinion is expressed that money rates will be sustained by these causes up to the time of the maturity of the \$150,000,000 of 4 per cent bonds, while the outcome will be affected by the alternative of the redemption of the whole issue or of partial refunding. It was inferred that obligations which were deferred during the stringency in money here were being covered on a large scale. The price of demand sterling rose fully 2 cents in the pound over that of last week. The high interest rates charged on stock market accounts for December had a discouraging effect on holders of stocks on margin. The average rate for the month charged by stock exchange houses was 12 per cent. The Hill stocks were supported and there was a subsidence of the rumors of money troubles growing out of the severe declines in these stocks. There were other points of occasional strength, but they yielded in the course of the trading. The market closed irregular and near the low prices of the day. Bonds were irregular. Total sales, par value, \$1,804,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

SHOW DETAILS ARRANGED

Exhibits Will Be Advantageously Displayed by Sheep Men.

Arrangements were completed yesterday for housing the exhibits to be shown here Jan. 12, 13 and 14 at the State Fair grounds on the occasion of the Fine and Fat Sheep Show to be held in conjunction with the annual convention of the National Wool Growers' association.

The committee of the show in charge of transportation and location facilities met at the Commercial club yesterday afternoon and decided that the exhibits calling for a display of five head or less should be grouped about the outer edge of the amphitheatre and the seven hunch exhibits calling for a display of three head will be grouped in the center of the amphitheatre and the seven hunch exhibits just outside them. Seven foot alleys will be maintained between the different sections of the exhibit. The floor will be covered with sawdust and the exterior and interior of the building will be elaborately decorated.

The general committee in charge of the show will meet in room 214 of the Commercial building this afternoon and complete final arrangements for the exhibition.


