UTAH'S SCHOOL SYSTEM.

State Superintendent Nelson's report on the public schools to Governor Cutler, shows a gratifying condition in the school system...

GOODING AND THE PRESIDENT.

If there had ever been any doubt as to the righteousness of Idaho's action in the Moyer-Haywood cases, it would be settled forever by Governor Gooding's inaugural address...

Commenting on the cases, the governor says: "The proceedings had, together with all matters of interest in the case, were the subject of strict inquiry by the president of the United States."

Some governors might think it an impudence, even in the president of the United States, to undertake an investigation as to the legality and regularity of an act initiated and executed by a sovereign state.

Yet, with swelling chest and pleased air, Gooding pats himself and avers that he is all right, Idaho is all right, everybody is all right because—well, because Roosevelt has looked into it and says it is all right.

It was a foregone conclusion the president would approve the action of the republican state administration, but, suppose he had decided that Idaho was wrong, that it had done an injustice to Moyer and Haywood, what would Gooding have done?

Of course there is only one answer to the supposititious question: the approval or condemnation of Roosevelt had no more bearing on the merits of the Moyer case than it has on any other judicial question.
