## JUDGE BOWMAN OPINE REPUBLICANISM

### Record of Party Traced From Landing of the Pilgrims.

Judge J. M. Bowman give an address at the University of Utah last evening, under the auspices of the Political Science League. His subject was "Principles of the Republican Party." Judge Bowman opened by saying that his talk would be from the standpoint of a Republican, but by that he did not mean that everything the Republicans did was right or that everything the Democrats did was wrong. In the course of his remarks Mr. Bowman said: "At the very beginning of this country, there were two classes of people: those who landed at Jamestown and those who made their homes at Plymouth. Each of these differed in thought and customs. "Those who settled at Plymouth were a people who sought religious purity and right and for this were called Puritans. They believed in equal rights. They taught that they were as good as King George or any monarch of Europe. "The people who came to Georgetown were cavaliers, soldiers of fortune, followers of Charles I. They believed in getting everything they could. They believed in the line of thought eventually bore fruit in slavery. They followed this line of thought until the war of 1861-65. "This was the beginning of the two great factions in this country. The puritans, who believed in having a government in the Republican platform of the Democratic party. "The judge then traced the history of the two parties through their different stages and to the present. He told of the great leaders on both sides and of the important part played by them in the first politics of this nation. "When Thomas Jefferson acknowledged state sovereignty as having the right to nullify a constitutional law," said Mr. Bowman, he lowered himself from the high pedestal of statesman to the level of a politician. It seems impossible that as great a man as he should have made such a blunder, but it only goes to show that no one is too great to make mistakes. "I want each and every one of you to study the history of our country, its wars, its struggles, its problems and what it has done. You must do this to call yourself an American citizen."

## W. S. CLAWSON'S WILL.

Only Child Beneficiary of \$2,000 Insurance Policy.

The will of Walter S. Clawson, a well-known local horseman and member of a prominent family, who died New Year's morning as the result of falling down a backless stair, was filed in probate court yesterday. The estate comprises a life insurance policy for \$2,000, a small amount of real estate, and a quantity of mining stock listed as being of speculative value. Sponsor Charles H. Clawson, who was recently made the guardian of the only child, Walter Allen Clawson, filed a petition that he be made executor of the will. The property to be held in trust for the beneficiary until he attains his majority, two years hence.

## SEEKS \$1,000 DAMAGES.

Aaron Says His Belongings Were Thrown Into the Street.

Gus S. Holmes was made the defendant in a suit for \$500 actual damages and \$500 punitive damages, filed by Max M. Aaron in the district court yesterday. Aaron alleges that he had a lease on the property at 112 East Second South street, operative until May 1, 1907. He conducted a saloon at the premises until Jan. 1, 1907, when he made preparations to install a dining and cleaning plant. He alleges that on Jan. 1, 1907, the employees of Holmes, acting under orders from him, ejected him from the premises and threw his belongings into the street.

## BARBER LAW HOLDS GOOD.

District Court Decides Measure is Constitutional.

The district court held yesterday that the state barber law is a constitutional one, when A. B. Ratliff, charged with failure to file with the state board of barbers' examiners a statement required of all barbers' apprentices, was convicted on an appeal case taken to the district court from the city court by the defendant.

In the city court Ratliff was found guilty and was fined \$5, and appealed the case. In the opinion of Judge Armstrong, the state barbers' law is constitutional. Sentence will be passed upon Ratliff today.

Nelson, in the district court, Judge Morse decided yesterday that the defendants had a right to fence a cement walk in Patrons' avenue, on the ground that they held a right of way over the ground covered by the walk. It is understood that an appeal may be taken.

Ruth Maude Abbott Pitts filed suit in the district court yesterday asking for a divorce from Joseph William Pitts. They were married in Salt Lake July 19, 1905, and the wife alleges that since the day of their marriage her husband has failed to provide for her.

Christian M. Poulsen, of Murray, filed petition in bankruptcy in the United States court Thursday. The amount of his liabilities is \$23,94 and his assets \$45, which he claims to be exempt.
