

THAW SAID WHEN HE SHOT WHITE

So Declares Dr. Austin Flint After Listening to a Question 15,000 Words Long.

ABE HUMMEL'S TESTIMONY DEFENSE MAY EXAMINE MR. JEROME.

New York, March 14.—Answering the same hypothetical question, in response to which the alienists of the defense declared Harry K. Thaw was suffering from an unsound mind and did not know the nature or quality of his act when he shot and killed Stanford White, Dr. Austin Flint, the first expert called today by District Attorney Jerome in rebuttal, declared it to be his opinion that Thaw positively did know the nature and quality of his act and knew that the act was wrong.

Declared Thaw Sane.

After receiving Dr. Flint's answer to the Delmas hypothetical question, Mr. Jerome had read to the witness the prosecution's hypothetical question which contained some 15,000 words, and which required one hour and eighteen minutes in its reading. Dr. Flint again said without qualification that Thaw knew his act was wrong, and is therefore liable for the murder in the first degree under the statutes of the state of New York.

Hummel's Testimony.

Abraham Hummel was on the stand again today and before Mr. Delmas could object to a question put by Mr. Jerome, the witness had got into the record the statement that Evelyn Nesbit had told him she had informed Harry Thaw in Paris in 1902 that Stanford White positively had not drugged or betrayed her.

Delmas May Call Jerome.

It was reported tonight that District Attorney Jerome may be called to the witness stand in re-rebuttal by the defense. The purpose, it was said, was to question Mr. Jerome as to certain actions against Abraham Hummel, who was a witness today.

HOURS LIMITED.

Jefferson City, Mo., March 14.—The house today passed the senate bill limiting the work-day of a train dispatcher to eight hours, except when an operator is employed only in the day time, when he can work twelve hours. The bill now goes to the governor.

ORDERS PASSAGE OF RIPPER BILL

"Boss" Spry Dictates to His Minions in Senate Cloakroom.

Flocking around their lord and master like sheep, the minions of "Boss" Spry, of the Smoot machine, took orders from him in the cloakroom of the upper house and proceeded to revive the "Ripper" bill, providing for a fire and police commission for Salt Lake to be appointed by the governor.

It was the most flagrant display of the absolute rule of Spry ever witnessed in Utah, and those who saw and heard the boss giving his commands while in whispered consultation with his dependents, were repelled and disgusted.

Those interviewed were Peter Clegg, senator from Tooele county, the man whom Callister interviewed in regard to the Galveston bills; Bishop Thomas C. Callister, senator from Millard county; Bishop Frederick Hasbani from Park City; Stake President John Y. Smith of Lelah, Utah county, and John H. Seely, senator from Sanpete county.

All are members of the committee on county and municipal corporations to which the bill was referred. Senator Benner X. Smith is the chairman, and the other member is E. T. Hulaniski of Ogden.

The latter were not present at the time, but when they arrived later found the Spry creatures in the committee room, and it was announced that it had been decided to recommend the bills for passage. Mr. Smith protested against calling the committee without giving him notice, saying that he had intended, as its chairman, to call a meeting after the session to consider this measure.

But the men who take their orders from Spry refused to heed, and Mr. Clegg announced that the bill was a good one and it had been decided to pass it. Bishop Callister and Stake President John Y. Smith were also of this opinion and, notwithstanding all protests, a majority report was written and signed by these gentlemen. Mr. Smith and Mr. Hulaniski signed a minority report, and both were presented to the senate just before it adjourned, but consideration of them was postponed until this morning.

Bill Unconstitutional.

That the bill is unconstitutional is believed by all the lawyers in the state, and for this reason not much alarm is felt that it will ever become operative, even if it should happen to pass. This is the measure which the federal machine has been banking its all upon, as it will turn over to Spry and Callister the immense patronage of the fire and police departments, and aid them materially in extending their machine. It was because of this measure that the Galveston bills were smothered.

The first intimation of any interference came yesterday morning after the passage of senate bill No. 157, by Hulaniski, providing civil service in fire and police departments of all cities in the state. Apparently the machine had not acted early enough, as this bill would, if passed, destroy the effect of the "Ripper" bill. Shortly after its passage Senator Clegg, the man whom Callister spoke about in the Galveston bills, was called to the telephone. Clegg received orders to give notice of a motion to reconsider the vote by which No. 157 passed, and this he did when he returned to the chamber.

NEW COUNTY OFFICERS.

Governor of Idaho Hands Out a Few Lucrative Jobs. (Special to The Herald.) Boise, Ida., March 14.—The governor named the officers of the new county of Bonner today. In doing so he was governed by the law passed at the close of the session prohibiting members from accepting offices they assisted in creating, thus cutting out Representatives Taylor and Finstad, who were slated for appointment, the former for auditor and the latter for assessor. The officers are: Auditor, Ignatz Well; sheriff, Edmund Doust; assessor, Frank H. Luce; probate judge, George R. Barker; treasurer, Andrew Christensen; attorney, Fred Johnson; coroner, William Knapp; surveyor, John R. Ashley; commissioners, W. J. Roth, John P. Dunn and A. J. Clark.
