ENGINEER HURT IN WRECK

Broken Wheel on Southern Pacific Freight Train Caused a Wreck at Deeth, Nev. Yesterday in Which Engineer Oscar Ohlson of This City Had His Knee Dislocated.

While attempting to pass between two freight cars coupled together in a train in the Rio Grande Western railroad yards at the Third South street crossing, Michael Marine, aged twenty-three years, was fatally injured.

Attracted by the screams of the injured man, three car repairmen, E. Magney, Luke Shaw and Louis Kohler, came to his assistance. They carried him to the baggage room, a short distance away.

Local agents of the Commercial Club, in the absence of the division superintendent in his stead, was notified of the accident and appeared on the scene.

Dr. Benjamin dressed the wounds and administered morphine to relieve the wounded man's agony.

Upon the arrival of the police authorities a council was held with Mr. Benjamin as to the proper course of action. Inasmuch as it was a county case, Dr. P. H. Raley, the assistant county physician, was called in.

Marine lived with his aged parents at No. 223 South Fifth West street. For about twelve years he had been insane, and was only recently discharged as cured from the state asylum at Provo.

The trial of Mike McCabe and James O'Leary, both soldiers of Fort Douglas, accused of having held up and robbed Harold Berrum, a contractor, on the night of Feb. 27, was begun before Judge Armstrong yesterday morning.

Berrum was on the stand the greater part of the forenoon. He positively identified the defendants as the men who held up and robbed him.

In the afternoon Berrum's daughter told what she had seen. She and her mother were waiting for Berrum's appearance that evening. When they heard a car go by they both looked out and saw a man get off. They immediately called to the conclusion that it was their father.
