THREE MEN ARE ARRESTED

SUNSET EXPRESS MEETS DISASTER IN CALIFORNIA.

Colton, Cal., March 28.—One of the most disastrous wrecks in the history of the southern Pacific occurred one and a half miles east of this town, shortly after 4 o'clock this afternoon, when westbound train No. 3, from New Orleans for San Francisco, ran into an open switch while going at the rate of forty miles an hour, and ten of the fourteen coaches were derailed with frightful results.

Twenty-six are Killed When Fast Train Runs Into Open Switch.

Hospital Filled.

The injured were carried to Colton and the Colton hospital was quickly filled to capacity. Many were then taken to the Presbyterian church and to private houses in the vicinity.

Open Switch to Blame.

The derailment of the train was caused by the loss of a switch engine leaving a switch open at this point. It is said that the engine passed through the switch a moment before the train appeared.

Three Arrests Made.

L. E. Alford, W. K. Davis and J. G. Gassmeyer, members of the switching crew who are accused of leaving the switch open and causing the wreck, were taken to the Colton jail and held in \$100 bail by Coroner Van Wye.

FORMER SAN FRANCISCO BOSS

Moved to House Once Used by Mayor.

San Francisco, March 28.—No indictments were returned today for graft or bribery by the grand jury, and only six witnesses were examined: A. B. Cass, president of the Home Telephone company of Los Angeles, who was subjected to further inquiries as to the accounts of that corporation and the fund of \$200,000 said to have been sent to San Francisco to insure their voting against bribing the supervisors to grant the Home company the competitive telephone franchise in this city, which was finally awarded, after the prosecution, approximately \$75,000 in bribes had been paid to the supervisors by the rival company to insure their voting against the award; J. J. Martin, president of the Phillips company of Los Angeles, who with J. S. Torrance, it is said, brought to San Francisco in an automobile the \$100,000 which, it is alleged, was also paid by the Home Telephone company for its franchise; \$25,000 to the city and \$75,000 to the local fund; George Beaman of the bookkeeping department of the Pacific States Telephone company, who was examined as to the similarity with the accounts of that corporation as they were affected by the bribes alleged to have been paid; John A. Malton, statistician of the Pacific States Telephone company; J. S. Torrance, of Los Angeles, one of the brokers who handled the bonds and mortgages of the Home company of that city; and Percy C. Morgan of the California Mine Producers' association, who was a member of the executive committee of the Pacific States company at the time the supervisory bribes are alleged to have been paid.

Bank Officers Called.

Mr. Heney stated that subpoenas to appear before the grand jury on Saturday were served today on officials of the Western National bank and the United States National bank of this city.

List of Confessors.


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SUBJECTED TO AWFUL ABUSE

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

PRESIDENT KERR ANNOUNCES RESIGNATION AND FIVE OTHERS REPUDIATE POLICY OF NEW BOARD OF TRUSTEES.


Professor Widtsoe Is Elected President of Institution and Is Authorized to Select a Faculty.

At a meeting of the board of trustees of the State Agricultural college, held in the secretary of state's office yesterday, Professor W. J. Kerr, president of the college, formally tendered his resignation to the board, to take effect June 30 next.

President Kerr's action follows his declaration in The Herald some days ago that he intended to resign his position as head of the institution. What was not expected, however, is that a portion of the faculty followed the lead of the president and also handed in their resignations, all of which were accepted by the board.

Kerr's Resignation.

The resignation of President Kerr was the first matter taken up. His letter was brief and to the point, and ran as follows: "To the board of trustees of the Agricultural college of Utah: Ladies and Gentlemen: I hereby tender my resignation as president of the
