


MORMON ADMINISTRATION BUILDING.

The basement will be of red sandstone and the rest of the building of buff brick with granite trimmings. The interior will be finished in hardwood.

THIRTY YEARS FOR MURDER

Thomas L. Sewell Pleaded Guilty to Killing Paul Morse in Wyoming.

district court to serve thirty years at hard labor in the state penitentiary. Had the case gone to trial Sewell would doubtless have been hanged. His counsel induced him, after much hard persuasion, to plead guilty to murder in the second degree.

The murder occurred last spring. Sewell and Morse were neighboring ranchmen in the Jackson's Hole country. Morse was a man quite well known throughout the country. He was a correspondent and had served as juror in the district court. He was a bachelor and lived alone on his ranch. It appears that he was rather aggressive in disposition and that he and Sewell were bitter enemies. Last spring, while Sewell's wife lay sick, Sewell's horses had strayed away on Morse's land. They had been driven off and across the river. Sewell inferred that Morse had done this and with the purpose of drowning his horses. Procuring his rifle he lay in ambush for Morse and shot him dead. He then walked to Morse's house, secured his rifle, discharged the only cartridge in it and placed it near the dead body of Morse, presumably to make it appear that a duel had been fought. Since his incarceration in the county jail his wife and children have lived here, where his children have attended school.

Only his wife was present at court when the sentence was pronounced against him, and both maintained a Spartan stoicism. It is said that not a word of regret for the occurrence has ever escaped his lips or been uttered by any member of the family. Sewell is about 42 years of age, his health is not good and it is seriously doubted if he will ever again see liberty.

Other sentences imposed by Judge Craig follow: C. D. Bash was given seven years for assault. C. J. Rutter was given fifteen months for forgery. He is 41 years of age and has a family in Wisconsin. The amount secured was \$17. E. A. Anderson, 29 years of age; Daniel C. Hayes, 27 years of age, and C. G. Graff, 29 years of age, were each given one year in the pen for looting cars and stealing some shoes. John Holland, 54 years of age, a machinist by trade, was given one year for forgery. Judge Craig rendered some good, fatherly advice to each of the younger prisoners before sentencing them. Each of the prisoners pleaded guilty.






