

STRIKE SPIRIT SEEMS DOMINANT

Apparent That Telegraphers Are Tired of Delay and Wish to End Uncertainty.

NEGOTIATIONS BROKEN OFF ASSESSMENT NOTICES ARE BEING SENT BY HUNDREDS.

Chicago, June 18.—Secretary Wesley Russell of the Commercial Telegraphers' union, returned to Chicago from New York, and announced today that a strike of the operators of the Western Union and Postal companies is practically a certain matter.

Day Will Decide. New York, June 18.—Whether a strike will be ordered to enforce the demands of the telegraphers employed by the Western Union for increased wages will be made known tomorrow, according to an announcement made today at the headquarters of the executive committee of the Commercial Telegraphers' union.

S. J. Koenekamp, who is acting as the head of the union in the absence of President Sam Small, who is out of the city, said today: "We will be able to announce positively tomorrow whether the union will order a strike or not. We will be in position to make our plans public."

Brokers' Strike Bulletin from Butte is Premature.

There was posted yesterday on the bulletin boards of a Second South street broker the announcement that, at 5 o'clock in the evening, the telegraph operators in Butte would walk out of the Western Union office. Service between Salt Lake and Butte is as it has been, and probably will continue to be for some length of time.

Continued from Page 1. I know from personal experience that the cars on that line and at the point where my half-brother was killed are constantly run at a high rate of speed, and I believe criminal negligence caused tonight's tragedy.

Street Car Men Silent. Motorman Porter refused to make a statement as to how the accident happened. Superintendent Arnold could not be reached, and all the other officials of the street railway company, including the wrecking crew, either refused to talk or professed not to know anything of the details of the accident.

Car Rested on Body. Jenkins' body is at Taylor's undertaking parlors on West Temple street. The funeral will probably be held Friday. The body lay under the car for about thirty minutes before the wrecking crew could release it.

Crawls Under Car. Fifty men worked frantically with the crew of the wrecking car last night to extract the body from under the wheels. Dr. J. C. Landenberg had been called, and he crawled under the car to ascertain whether Mr. Jenkins was dead or not.

Had On Air Brake. Car No. 43 is a big, modern car, supplied with an air brake that was in working condition last night at the time of the accident. It was fairly well loaded with passengers.

He was born in Salt Lake Feb. 8, 1859, and had lived here all his life. He was unmarried. The funeral will be held Friday afternoon, though the details have not been decided upon. It is understood the deceased was possessed of considerable property. The remains will be at Taylor's until Friday.
