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ATTORNEY DARRROW TESTIMONY CHARGED Defense Accuses Detective McParland of Wrongful Conduct in Haywood Case --Evidence Is Ruled Out.

Many Witnesses Testify That Explosion in Bradley Home Was Directly Caused by Leaking Gas Pipes.

Boise, July 9.—The defense in the Stenberg murder case today charged that Detective James McParland had been guilty of an attempt to manufacture testimony against William D. Haywood, but was unsuccessful in getting the basis and details of the charge before the court and jury.

Alva A. Swain, a newspaper correspondent who represents the Pueblo Chieftain at Denver, was called to the stand and questioned as to a conversation he had with Detective McParland in Denver last fall. Senator Borah, for the state, objected to the conversation on the ground that no foundation had been laid for it.

Clarence Darrow, for the defense, who was examining Swain, explained that the testimony was offered for the purpose of showing that there existed a conspiracy between the mine owners and the Pinkertons to secure the conviction and execution of the prisoner. McParland approached this witness in an attempt to manufacture testimony," he declared, "and I believe we have a right to show it."

Judge Wood said there was nothing in the evidence that furnished a proper foundation for the introduction of such testimony, and sustained by the state's objection. The defense took an exception and said that it would later make another attempt to secure the admission of Swain's testimony. Counsel for the defense are exceedingly confident in reaching the matter through McParland himself, but it is quite probable that the state will not call McParland as a witness.

WITNESS AFTER WITNESS SAYS BRADLEY HOUSE WRECKED BY GAS

Boise, Idaho, July 9.—The Haywood trial recommenced today this morning when the reading of the San Francisco depositions was continued.


With the prospect that another full day would have to be given over to the reading of the San Francisco depositions covering the explosion at the apartments of Fred W. Bradley, which occurred on October, 1904, there were few spectators in court this morning when the trial was resumed.

Gas Testimony Read.

The next deposition taken up was that of Mrs. Charles Pickard, who as Mrs. Crow had been the cook in the Bradleys as cook. She told of having smelled gas in the house for several days prior to the explosion, and had called up the gas company to complain of it.

Mrs. Crow declared absolutely that she had gone to the theatre with Orland as he testified. She declared that he told a falsehood when he testified to that effect.

The witness declared the explosion was more like a thud than a sharp report. Attorney Darrow next took up the deposition of Mrs. Lucy A. Cummings, who occupied one of the flats in the building with the Bradleys. She described the explosion as the most terrible noise she had ever heard in her life.
