THE CASE OF PILOT NICHOLS.

While the president and his party were steaming on the Mississippi the other day the chief executive took offense at the handling of a boat which contained the Pittsburg delegates to the Memphis gathering because, he said, the pilot of the boat risked collision with the presidential steamer.

There was no hearing in the case, no opportunity for Nichols, the pilot, to be heard in his own defense, no investigation of any kind—just a snap judgment by the president of the nation which deprives a competent man of earning his living at the only vocation he is skilled in.
