

BOUND OVER TO DISTRICT COURT

Preliminary Hearing of Fred S. Walker and Edward Lawrence is Concluded.

DEFENDANTS MAY GET BAIL

WIFE OF BEERS THE CONCLUDING WITNESS.

(Special to The Herald.) Ogden, Oct. 15.—Fred S. Walker and Edward Lawrence were this morning bound over to the district court by Judge Murphy. No mention of bail was made, as the committing magistrate has no authority to fix bail in capital offenses.

Question of Bail. District Attorney Halverson will prepare the information charging the defendants with murder in the first degree at once, and they will be brought before Judge Howell on an application for bail as soon as possible.

Examination Concluded.

The preliminary examination of the men, which was postponed from Thursday of last week, was concluded before Judge Murphy in police court this morning.

Hutchinson then asked: "What, if anything, was said by you to him (referring to Mr. Walker) other than what you stated heretofore on the witness stand?"

Judge Declares Himself.

At this juncture an amusing little rumpus occurred between the attorneys and the court. Mr. Harris had objected to a certain question relating to the Salt Lake trip, when Judge Murphy said: "This court is not sitting for the purpose of influencing public sentiment by any statement held yourself to the rules of law in these matters."

The witness was then questioned regarding the conversation had with Edward Lawrence and she stated that Mr. Lawrence made to her nothing at all in it.

Motion to Strike Out. This ended the testimony in the case and Mrs. Beers was excused from the stand.
