COAL CASES TO SUPREME COURT

President Roosevelt and Cabinet Decide to Continue the Fight.

LEWIS RAISES NEW POINT GOVERNMENT EXPENDS \$200,000 GATHERING EVIDENCE.

Washington, Dec. 31.—At the last cabinet meeting of the year 1907, held today, the decision was reached by the president and attorney general that the government will use every measure in its power to bring about in the higher courts its disapproval of the decision rendered in Colorado by Judge Lewis that there is no law against citizens agreeing in advance to purchase coal or other public lands that may be acquired by others, under what is known as the dummy entryman system.

Lack of Harmony Evident.

The commissioner of the general land office said today that his department had not initiated the land fraud cases which have, in a few instances, been dismissed by Federal judges. Although the land office is co-operating in every possible way with the department of justice in bringing fraudulent entrymen to justice, the interior department is not inclined to do with bringing the indictments which have been quashed, and there are intimations that the latter department partially agrees with Judge Lewis in his ruling that the persons accused of illegally acquiring lands cannot be held under the indictments as drawn, at least as they apply to violations of the timber and stone act.

Land Office Ready to Act.

It is understood that the land office is about ready to call from sixty to eighty violations of the land laws in the Colorado region to the attention of the grand jury. Some of these may involve a number of the very persons whom Judge Lewis has discharged. Commissioner Ballinger holds that it is specifically provided in the act of 1878 that the claimant of land must make a showing at the time of the application that he does not take the land for the benefit of any other person.

Raises a New Point.

Sylvester R. Rush, special assistant to the attorney general, who has been active in the prosecution of land thieves in Denver, arrived here today from Denver, where he has had charge of several government cases. He declined to criticize Judge Lewis' decision, but declared that the decision had raised an entirely new point, which would have to be decided by the supreme court. He said that a number of federal judges and supreme court justices had ruled entirely opposite from Judge Lewis in his decision in the Colorado cases which were carried to the United States supreme court. Special Attorney Rush has had charge of the numerous land cases prosecuted in the federal court in Denver, and his sentences and fines have been imposed on several of the large and prominent ranchers of Nebraska and South Dakota.

Great Waste of Money.

There are now but two cases left of the score or more indictments returned by the grand jury last May for alleged Colorado land frauds, and unless the supreme court reverses the decision of Judge Lewis more than \$200,000 expended by the government in collecting evidence will have been wasted.

Defense Ready to Fight.

The defendants claim that they legally entered upon the homesteads, and that the lands are not coal lands, as claimed by the government. It was with the view of discovering whether or not the Porter land was a coal tract, that the defendants, in their writings would disclose a vein of coal running through the Porter lands that Joseph A. Walker, secret service agent, made the trip to Hesperus two months ago, when he was in the employ of the Porter land. No borings have been made upon the Porter land, and the defense will attempt to show that guesses as to the possibilities of coal deposits are of no value when a man is on trial for his liberty.
