

# WILL CUT TIMBER ON LARGE SCALE

## San Vincente Lumber Company Has Big Project in California.

### NOW READY TO OPERATE

#### M. H. GROVER LEAVES TO PUT UP SAWMILL.

M. H. Grover, resident manager of the San Vincente Lumber company, left Salt Lake yesterday for Santa Cruz, Cal., where he will superintend the establishment of a large saw mill for his company in the redwood forest recently purchased by this company in Santa Cruz county.

On 8,000 acres of forest land recently acquired by the company, there are 200,000,000 feet of redwood, fir and hard woods. Options on this timber were secured for the company over a year ago by F. S. Murphy of Salt Lake from the Santa Cruz Lumber company, which had purchased the land from its original Spanish owners for the lime rock that was found on it. The land is a part of an old Spanish grant, and its title has never passed through the United States company.

The San Vincente Lumber company has already made arrangements for the erection of a large saw mill in the heart of its redwood forest. Machinery for the new mill has been purchased from the D. J. Murray Manufacturing company of Waukegan, Wis., and will be shipped within a few weeks. The new mill is to cost \$200,000, and will be equipped with the latest improved machinery. It will have a capacity of 300,000 feet a day, and will employ 50 men the year round. The saw mill is known as the band type and has a band re-saw.

Transportation facilities for the company are the best. The new Ocean Shore railroad being built from San Francisco to Santa Cruz will pass over the company's land. It has been built south to a point within two and a half miles of the redwood forest. The Southern Pacific branch running from Santa Cruz to Havemont passes within three and a half miles from the site of the new mill. Spur tracks will be built into the woods and logging roads opened. The logging trucks will be standard gauge and equipped with heavy steel rails to sustain the weight of the giant redwood trees.

### Trees Are Very Large.

Most of the trees in the forest are very large, and some of them too large to be handled easily. A stump, remaining after the tree had been broken off sixty feet from the ground, measured at its top ten feet in diameter and fifteen feet at its base. It contained 150,000 feet of lumber. A single cut of many of these trees is more than could be hauled out of the forest on the cars and has to be blasted into quarters with giant powder.

The new mill will be in operation by March, 1909, and by that time the railroad construction work necessary to provide transportation facilities will have been completed. The mill will manufacture in addition to lumber, redwood shingles and fir laths. The company expects to find a market for its entire output within a radius of 100 miles from the mill. The forest acquired is the largest in the southern half of California, and is the only one in that vicinity so that there will be little or no competition in the territory in which it will be marketed. Northern California lumbermen are forced to pay such high freight rates to get into this territory that they cannot hope to compete with a local company.

The headquarters for the San Vincente Lumber company is in Salt Lake, where will be located the many offices. Mr. Grover will remain in local charge of the mill near Santa Cruz. The directors of the company are C. W. Nibley, George Stoddard, W. W. Ritter, M. H. Grover and F. S. Murphy. Most of the stock is owned by the directors.

# E. P. MATTHEWS BELIEVES SON WAS SLUGGED AND PLACED ON TRACK

Believing that his son's death was due to foul play, Edward P. Matthews, a real estate dealer of Colorado Springs, Colo., is in Salt Lake, investigating the circumstances surrounding young Matthews' tragic end on March 29, when his mangled body was found beside the tracks in the Rio Grande yards here.

At the time young Matthews was found, an investigation was made, which resulted in the conclusion that he had been accidentally killed while attempting to board a train in an effort to beat his way back to his home in Colorado Springs. The boy was a member of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks, and some of the Rio Grande trainmen stated that he had been promised a ride on a slow train out of the city, but had made an effort to catch a fast train and had been killed.

The boy's father is not willing to believe that the death was accidental. He says that young Matthews must have had considerable money on the night of his

death, and thinks it strange that only 75 cents was found upon his body. The boy was 19 years old, and had no bad habits, the father says. He left a good position in Colorado Springs because of falling eyesight. Before he went away, he drew from the banks there \$2. That was ten days before the fatal accident. The father does not believe the boy, who was frugal and careful, could have spent the money in so short a time.

"I think that my son was murdered by thieves," he said yesterday, "and that his body was thrown upon the tracks before the train."

As Chief of Police Pitt was not able to give Mr. Matthews any information concerning young Matthews' death, he tried to suppress the fact that the father was in Salt Lake, apparently thinking that the father's independent investigation reflected upon the efficiency of the police department.

# AN ELECTRIC MOTOR STEED

## Ingenious Device by Which One May Enjoy a Canter in a Room.



To experience all the exhilaration of a cross-country gallop without leaving the comforts of one's office, to be able to canter, trot or gallop at will these frosty mornings with no fear of nipped toes or fingers, is a privilege denied the rank and file of enthusiasts who regard horseback riding as the greatest of all sports. With a slight exception Detroit devotees of the saddle will continue for some time to take their constitutional in the same old way. That exception is George Stroh, 548 East Grand Boulevard, secretary and treasurer of the American Tap Bush company.

In a room adjoining Mr. Stroh's private office, on Jefferson avenue, stands

one of the most novel "steeds" that has ever supported a saddle. It is nothing more or less than an exerciser, shown in the accompanying picture, and is operated by means of an electric motor.

Surmounting an iron pedestal, with an arm extending forward and upward to supplant the neck of the surr, enough of the horse, is the saddle. Running from the



propelling mechanism at the front and connecting with the saddle is a long rod which, at the point where it approaches the pedestal, is divided, forming two prongs. Extending through the base and prongs is a pivot, and at the side of the flywheel is another to give the required play.

Mounting the "steed," the electric current is turned on and the ride begins, the teetering motion being precisely the same as that of a horse in action. Any desired gait can be obtained by merely adjusting a set screw, a fraction of a minute being sufficient to make the change. A counter weight permits adjustment of the mechanism to accommodate any weight and secured the desired results.

Although so far as known this is the first device of the kind in the United States, they are common abroad, particularly in Germany, where they are manufactured. They are employed in training cavalrymen for the German army and are a pronounced success. The device was imported from Germany and those who have been permitted to try it declare the sensation precisely the same as would come from riding a real flesh and blood horse.

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# WHEN MONITOR AND MERRIMAC MET

## Recalled by Anniversary of Struggle of Ironclads.

March 9 was the anniversary of the battle of the Monitor and the Merrimac in Hampton Roads. Apropos of that great sea fight, Bishop Mackay-Smith related yesterday several interesting anecdotes about Admiral Worden, who commanded the victorious ironclad. The admiral was a member of St. John's church, in Washington, while Bishop Mackay-Smith was rector there, and when the old fighter died his rector was at his side.

The final scene in the admiral's life was thus described by the bishop: "The admiral lay in bed staring with black lustrous eyes. I asked him: 'You know me, do you not, admiral?'"

"His answer was: 'No, I never saw you before in my life.'"

"Why, don't you know how a dozen times you have told me about your great fight with the Merrimac and about President Lincoln's visit to your bedside when you were down with erysipelas; how you told him it was a great honor he did you, and how he told the honor was his, and he permitted to be in the presence of so great a commander?"

"No, it's all a mistake. I never commanded the Monitor. The only brig of Cornwall, I remember I commanded in that battle, but I can't remember fighting the Merrimac."

"But, admiral, we have not had with Britain since 1812. Never mind, though. You're going home now and I hope you'll have a good voyage."

"Looking up to heaven, the dear old fellow said: 'Yes, it's all right.'"

"And these were the last words he ever spoke."

"It was very pathetic to see Admiral Worden try to pass the time away. His last year was spent in great comfort in Washington, thither he retired after having commanded at Annapolis. Like so many of the men who fought in the civil war, he was reggie when it was over. He used to try to kill time by riding to and fro between the capitol and the northern end of Sixteenth street in the old ramshackle omnibuses which ran over that route. They were drawn by poor broke-down horses at a speed probably not exceeding four miles an hour. Huddled up in a corner of one of those vehicles, his shoulders covered with a heavy cap, the admiral was a forlorn looking old man, indeed, not because he looked friendless, for, of course, he was not, but because he conveyed the impression that he would rather be doing anything else and yet to do what he was doing was better than doing nothing."

"It was a pleasure to hear Admiral Worden tell of Lincoln's visit to his bedside. He would relate with so much regret the fact that the great commander, tears falling down his face, said: 'Sir, the honor is mine, indeed, to be permitted to stand beside a com-


