DISMEMBERED CORPSES FOUND IN BARNYARD

Discovery of Four Additional Bodies Deepens Laporte Murder Mystery.

VICTIMS POSSIBLY KILLED IN CHICAGO

TWO TRUNKS CONSIGNED TO MRS. BELLE GUINNESS HELD IN WINDY CITY.

Laporte, Ind., May 6.—A possible solution of the Guinness farm mystery, which was deepened today when four additional bodies were found in the barnyard, developed this afternoon.

Identification Uncertain. A. K. Heiglein, whose inquiries regarding his missing brother, Andrew, led to the first discovery of the Guinness farm, became sure that the largest and best preserved of the corpses is that of his relative.

Evidence Against Lamphere. Ray Lamphere, who is held on a charge of first degree murder, growing out of the fire which destroyed the Guinness home and caused the death of Mrs. Guinness and her three children, offered no new evidence, despite repeated questionings.

Probable Murder of Child. Devising into the past of Mrs. Guinness, the authorities found the unexplained death in her immediate family, which they think may shed light on the present tragedy.

Hundreds of Curious Ones. The Guinness farm was a Mecca for sightseers today. When Sheriff Smutzer and his assistants reached the place this morning and resumed the task of delving for bodies, teams, bicycles and automobiles were lined along the ornamental wire fence which separates the wooded grounds from the highway.



(Special to The Herald.) Seattle, Wash., May 6.—Joseph Cordova, alias Joe Garcia, wanted for the murder of Patrolman Charles S. Ford in Salt Lake City, walked into a trap laid for him at Pike Place at 7:20 o'clock this evening, and was mortally wounded in a battle with police detectives.

Garcia saw Emery and whipped out two revolvers from his pockets. It has not been established whether or not he fired another shot, but it did not get a mark, and before he could fire again the fusillade from the officers began.

Joe Garcia was the Mexican-Chinese half-breed porch climber who operated in Salt Lake for about four months last fall and winter, committing a chain of remarkable robberies in private residences.

RING ONCE WORN BY A NAVAL HERO

National Museum in Possession of Relic of Heroic Richard Somers.

Washington, May 6.—The United States national museum has just received as a bequest from the late Stephen Decatur Smith, through his son, S. Decatur Smith, Jr., of Philadelphia, a plain gold ring, formerly the property of Commodore Stephen Decatur, given him by his fellow officer, Richard Somers, at Tripoli, in 1804.

Heroic Death of Somers. In the war against pirates of Tripoli, who for years had preyed upon American commerce and had succeeded in capturing the American ship Philadelphia, Commodore Preble fitted the Intrepid as a bomb vessel to explode in the midst of the Tripolitans and cause a panic, and on the night of Sept. 4, 1804, dispatched it on its mission in charge of Richard Somers.

Murderer Conscious. Garcia did not lose consciousness after the shooting and admitted that he was the man wanted for the murder of Patrolman Ford after he had held up the Albany bar in Salt Lake City.

Butte, Mont., May 6.—Lewis Ferris, a Jefferson county rancher, who was shot in the leg Monday morning by Police Sergeant Sinzel while trying to evade arrest on suspicion of being implicated in the attempted hold-up of the north coast limited on the Northern Pacific at Welch's spur, tonight, at St. James hospital, is reported, made a confession in connection with the dynamiting of the Burlington overland limited near this city last Friday night, in which wreck three persons lost their lives.

RECEIVERS APPOINTED. Trenton, N. J., May 6.—Receivers were appointed today for the West Virginia-New Jersey bridge company. Following the suicide of President Morgan D. Magee of the First National bank of Manassas last Friday, it became known that his bank had loaned upwards of \$200,000 to the bridge company of which he was a stockholder.

PAPER DEALERS BROKE.

Milwaukee, Wis., May 6.—Creditors of the Koch & Leber company, paper dealers, today filed an involuntary petition in bankruptcy against that company. The liabilities, it is said, will aggregate \$129,000 and the assets are estimated at \$150,000.

BOULEVARD TO CONNECT TWO NEW STATIONS


Rio Grande and Short Line Join in Project to Help Beautify City.

BLOODY WORK OF 16-YEAR-OLD ITALIAN APPRENTICE IN BROOKLYN

Slashes the Throats of Three Journeyman Barbers and Attacks His Employer and Wife With Razor.

New York, May 6.—A 16-year-old boy, known only as Carmello, and employed in a barber shop in Brooklyn, early today cut the throats of his employer, Antonio Peraso, Mrs. Peraso and three barbers while they lay asleep in Peraso's apartments in Fulton street.

Desperate Fight for Life. Peraso, who with his wife was asleep in an adjoining room, was awakened by a stab in his neck and engaged the boy in a desperate struggle.

Black Hand Murder.

The police have a theory that the boy was an agent of a Black Hand gang. The police believe that the gang which had been demanding money of Peraso under threat of doing him injury, and that the blackmailers placed the boy in the shop in order to punish Peraso for his refusal to satisfy their demands.
