THE DEATH RECORD. Rear Admiral Crowninshield. Philadelphia, May 27.—Rear Admiral A. S. Crowninshield, U. S. N., retired, died at the Episcopal hospital here today. The admiral had been in the hospital for about a month and an operation was performed on him for an affliction of the nose. He never fully recovered from the shock of the operation. The immediate cause of death, however, was hardening of the tissues of the body. Mrs. Crowninshield died at the admiral's bedside when he died. Admiral Crowninshield was 72 years old and had been in poor health for more than a year. Services over the body were held in the chapel of the Episcopal hospital this afternoon. The body will be taken to Washington tomorrow and interment will be made in Arlington cemetery with honors.

Judge Thomas M. Macon. Denver, May 27.—Judge Thomas M. Macon, who had been in the hospital for a long time, died at the age of 78, read law with Abraham Lincoln at Bloomington, Ill., for a time. He was born in Kentucky and had resided in Colorado more than forty years. Judge Macon defended Dr. Thatcher Graves at his trial on the charge of poisoning a wealthy Rhode Island woman, which ended in a disagreement of the jury.

F. J. Tourtelet. St. Paul, May 27.—F. J. Tourtelet, superintendent of the dining car service of the Northern Pacific Railroad company, died at St. Joseph's hospital today, aged 65 years. He had been ill with heart trouble for ten years.

David E. Howland. Worcester, Mass., May 27.—David E. Howland, who during the past two national campaigns was in charge of the literary bureau at the headquarters of Republican headquarters, died today at the state hospital at Bloomingdale.

THREE YEARS IN PRISON. Cleveland Real Estate Dealer Made Money Too Fast. Cleveland, May 27.—J. W. Hamby, a prominent real estate dealer, involved in frauds that are believed to have amounted to hundreds of thousands of dollars, was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary at hard labor this afternoon. Hamby was charged with obtaining money by altering the title of certificates. The Hamby Realty company, of which he was president, afterwards assigned in favor of creditors.

EARLY WORK ON THE PLATFORM Taft People With Aid of Roosevelt Will Soon Have One Ready.

Washington, May 27.—At least a tentative draft of the Republican national platform will be prepared in Washington. Already arrangements are making for conferences on the subject. The likelihood is that the conferences will be held in the platform conference room of the time the delegates to the convention turn their faces toward Chicago. The declaration of principles will have been whipped into shape and tucked away in the inside pocket of a prospective member of the committee on resolutions.

Plank From Ohio Platform. Arthur I. Vorys, the Ohio manager of Secretary Taft's preliminary campaign, is in Washington today conferring with Mr. Taft. It can be said that he did not come to the capital primarily to discuss the platform with the secretary, but on business of a different character. It is expected that Wade H. Ellis, attorney general of Ohio, who is one of the delegates-at-large from that state, will have a part in the preparation of the platform. He drew the tariff revision plank of the platform adopted by the Republicans at Chicago at their last convention and anticipated that a somewhat similar declaration respecting the tariff will be adopted at Chicago, particularly if the governor of Secretary Taft should control the convention.

Several Conferences. Secretary Taft had a conference late this afternoon with Frank H. Hitchcock, eastern and southern manager of his campaign, and Mr. Vorys. Concerning the conference nothing was disclosed beyond the general fact that it related to the final details of the preliminary campaign.

Mr. Vorys will leave for Columbus tomorrow. Mr. Hitchcock and Mr. Vorys called at the White House this afternoon and had a half-hour talk with the president. Mr. Vorys said he had called simply to pay his respects to the president.
