### CANNON WILL FIGHT LABOR TO FINISH

Speaker Descends Upon Chicago to Take a Hand in Platform Making.

### IN CONFERENCE WITH TRUSTY LIEUTENANTS

Chicago, June 14.—A sensation was caused tonight by the unexpected arrival in Chicago of one of the presidential candidates, "Uncle Joe" Cannon. He arrived from Danville late this afternoon, going to the Union League club, where he was soon in conference with some of the most prominent leaders of the New York, chairman of the committee on ways and means; Mr. Dalzell of Pennsylvania, the ranking member of that committee; Representative Overstreet of Indiana, Representative James S. Sherman of New York, who has the congressional backing for the vice presidency; Richard Kerens of Missouri, and a number of delegates from Illinois, Missouri and other states.

### PLATFORM CONTEST.

It soon developed that Speaker Cannon's coming was in connection with the platform and that a very brisk contest on some of the planks was in prospect.

### DECIDED TO COME IN PERSON.

The speaker is not an adept in talking over a long-distance telephone and he has finally decided to take a train to Chicago and go over the platform in person.

### POSITION OF THE HOUSE.

Meanwhile, Mr. Cannon and his congressional lieutenants are thoroughly going over the platform planks concerning the restriction of injunctions.

### THE SPEAKER'S VIEWS.

The speaker's views on this subject were outlined to his friends tonight as being identical to those exhibited two years ago when he said in opening the congressional caucus that:

### PETE BOGDAN VICTIM OF MURDEROUS ASSAULT AT THE HIGHLAND BOY MINE

Two Austrians, George Mandrich and Pete Crinich, were arrested this morning by Deputy Sheriff J. L. Forbes as being responsible for the shooting. They were taken to Salt Lake this afternoon to await the county jail to await the action of the county authorities.

While nothing authentic can be learned because of the conflicting stories that have been told, it is said that the shooting was the termination of an old feud that has been worrying the county authorities in camp for the past few years.

Bogdan, a lad about 20 years old, is a cousin of John and Mike Bogdan, who have figured in all the shooting affairs of the upper camp in recent years.
