


LADIES ENTERTAINED IN A ROSE GARDEN

FORMER CHIEF FIGHTS FIRE

Charles T. Vail Assists Department in Extinguishing Blaze in Livery Barn.

THEATRE IS THREATENED

FORTY HORSES ARE DRIVEN FROM BURNING BUILDING.

Former Fire Chief Charles T. Vail last night couldn't resist the temptation to assist the firemen he had been with for eighteen years. He helped at a fire in the livery stable of William Holt at 35 South State street and ruined a new \$40 suit of clothes.

The former chief was across the street at the Empire theatre, in which he has just bought an interest, when the alarm of fire was turned in. He ran across the street and assisted employees in getting the forty horses a large number of vehicles and harness out of the barn.

When the firemen reached the livery barn that was on fire Charles T. Vail just naturally became a pipeman of hose company No. 1. He didn't give an order, but obeyed all that he received from the officers of the department whom he formerly commanded. When the former fire chief discarded his uniform a few days ago he purchased a new \$40 summer suit. Apparently he forgot that he had this on last night, for it didn't hinder him in working in the fire and water, and in consequence the suit, of course, was ruined.

The fire started in a shed, in which four tons of baled hay were stored, at the rear of the livery stable, at 11 o'clock. The cause of the fire has not been determined. It was discovered by a person who saw the flames from Main street, and the alarm was turned in from Box 121, in front of the C. C. M. The firemen started for Main street, but were turned back to the fire before they had gone far out of the way.

When the fire was reached the flames from the shed were threatening the destruction of the livery barn, the Grand theatre and the Studebaker building. At the time the firemen reached the scene all of the horses had been driven out of the barn. They ran around the block and tried to re-enter the barn. After the fire was extinguished many of the horses were still at large. Before morning, however, nearly all of them were taken back to the barn. The total loss will not exceed \$100.

The firemen extinguished the blaze just quickly enough to prevent serious damage to the Studebaker building at 151 South State street, the window casings of which were scorched.

Two fire alarms came in to the department yesterday morning. One, from Fourth South and West Temple, proved to have been turned in by mistake. The other was from 28 West Sixth South street, where there was a fire in a shed of a building occupied by B. A. M. Froese. The damage was less than \$50.

As a result of the fire, the firemen requested that all rubbish be removed from the back yards before July 4, because of the danger of fires from explosives used in the celebration of the day.
