Through Herald Bulletin, W. S. Mason learns of Wakerly's Death in Philippines.

W. S. Mason of San Francisco, while reading The Herald bulletins yesterday noticed a dispatch from Manila containing the information that H. F. Everitt, government forester, and T. R. Wakerly, a school teacher, had been killed by hill tribesmen on June 24. Mr. Mason is on his way back from Manila, having come by way of the Suez canal. He says he knew Wakerly in the Philippines and that when he left there on March 25 last Wakerly was in charge of a school district in the island of Negros.

MORE LEAVE TOWARD JEWS

Russian Government Has Decided to Adopt Different Policy in Future.

New York, July 10.—Dispatches from London and St. Petersburg to the Jewish Daily News today says the Russian government has decided to adopt a more tolerant attitude with reference to its Jewish subjects. The London dispatch says that the British foreign office has received a report from the British ambassador at St. Petersburg to the effect that Russia is willing to enter into a treaty with England regarding the rights of Jewish subjects of the Jewish faith to sojourn and transact business in Russia. It adds further that this is to be the first evidence on the part of Russia of a more liberal policy toward the Jews in the future, both as regards its own subjects and foreign subjects of the Jewish faith. The dispatch from St. Petersburg confirms this news but does not speak optimistically of the promises made by Russia regarding the Jews. It declares that all the concessions named are of a minor character and even these may be withdrawn after having been in force long enough to assist the government in securing a loan from Jewish bankers in Europe, who the dispatch says have kept aloof from all foreign loans floated by Russia.

CHARGED WITH BRIBERY.

Louisville Contractor Is Accused of Crooked Work.

Louisville, Ky., July 10.—A dramatic denunciation by a member of the board of aldermen in full meeting tonight was followed by the arrest of Lee Figg, a prominent and wealthy contractor on the charge of bribery. Alderman C. A. Hess, chairman of a committee having in charge the paving contracts of the city was called on to make a report on certain work, and he astonished the board by telling them that Figg had offered him \$5,000 to make a favorable report on certain contracts. Figg was standing outside the railing in the chamber at the time he was denounced and was immediately arrested. He gave bond immediately in the sum of \$5,000. He made a statement declaring that every word of Hess' statement was false.

FLEET HEARD FROM.

San Francisco, July 10.—The government wireless station on the Farallones, twenty miles off the Golden Gate, was last in communication with the Atlantic fleet at 8 o'clock last night. At that time the fleet was reported to be 540 miles out, with fine weather prevailing. The formation was still in line of squadron, except when maneuvering for exercise.
