

# MINERS VICTIMS OF NEGLIGENCE

## Methods of Mining in Russia Are Worse Than Criminal.

Tuzovo, Russia, July 10.—An inquest into the fatal coal mine explosion of last week has revealed a terrible picture of the methods of mining in vogue in Russia, and the utter absence of inspection. It has been a matter of common knowledge for years past that the Rittovsk mine was dangerous. The workmen named it "The Inferno" because of the prevalence of suffling gas in the workings for double wages. The explosion itself was not of great force and a majority of the 300 men who lost their lives were burned to death or suffocated by afterward.

It would have been possible to save but a dozen below if prompt measures had been taken, as fully one hour elapsed after the explosion before the flames broke out. During this hour the rescuing party waited with folded hands for information as to how and where they were to descend. Immediately after the explosion, the mine engineer recklessly descended the main shaft without a mask. He was overcome by the damp and brought to the surface. He had to be revived, after which he drew a rough sketch of the interior of the mine, and it was on this that the rescuing party went ahead.

# COINED MONEY AT WILL

## Prominent Lawyer of Illinois Has Complete Plant for Counterfeiting Legal Tender.

Danville, Ill., July 10.—Charles E. Brown, 35 years old, an attorney prominent socially and professionally, was arrested here today by secret service men on a charge of counterfeiting, and later held to await action by the United States grand jury in bonds of \$5,000. In a secret desk and a cellar of Brown's home, where he was arrested in the presence of his wife and 3-year-old child, the government agent found what they say is the most complete counterfeiting outfit they have ever seen. It was ready for the manufacture of five dollar gold pieces, silver half-dollars, quarters, dimes and nickels, and the secret service men pronounced the materials of the mint almost perfect.

### WILL ATTEMPT FLIGHT.

#### German Aeronaut to Sail in Enormous Airship.

Berlin, July 10.—Arrangements are being completed for Count Zeppelin's twenty-four-hour flight in his new giant airship to take place July 14. There are to be twenty-two relays of automobiles carrying army officers, who will follow the "Dreadnaught" of the air along the roads from Friedrichshafen to Mayence. The occupants of the motor cars will communicate by telegraph with headquarters on the Lake of Constance, reporting incidents and the progress of the flight. Each motor car will carry a large white flag in the day in order to be recognized by the military posts and police stations along the route, as well as the Rhine river police, have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness, night and day, to give assistance.

### BELIEVES SON MESSIAH.

#### Mother Brands Him on Forehead With Hot Iron.

New York, July 10.—Asserting that her 6-year-old son, Charles Goodall, was the Messiah, his mother, Mrs. Grace Goodall, branded him for life on the forehead and throat with a red hot iron. The child was rescued early today from the religious-crazed woman and both were taken to the Bellevue hospital, where the mother told the police and hospital authorities that she had branded the boy, whom she believed to be the long-looked-for Messiah, so that he would be known, marked and distinct from others for life. The police charge that the woman also tried to kill her mother, with whom she lived, and herself. The little boy, though terribly burned, will recover. The two women were placed in the psychopathic ward for observation.

### HOPED TO SEE FUN.

#### Boy Says He Wanted Train to Jump Track.

Pottsville, Pa., July 10.—To have the engine jump the track and see the fun was the explanation of 9-year-old John Sovick of Morea, near this place, today when arrested for placing a piece of iron pipe and stones on the track just before the Pennsylvania railroad flyer was due. He was caught in the act and brought to Pottsville, where he was committed to prison. He made no attempt to deny his guilt, and not comprehending the serious character of the offense, explained away that he was only playing. He gave the officers information of several other attempts at train wrecking in that section, and several more arrests will be made.

Mrs. Leafgreen's words that she was married to Howard, a St. Louis brick manufacturer and that two days later he deserted her. The defense contends she was never married to Howard but was married, instead, to Thomas Jefferson Miller, who was mayor of Lunawater, Wash.

### HAPGOOD IS DISCHARGED.

New York, July 10.—Herbert J. Hapgood, president of Hapgoods, incorporated, and his secretary, Ralph K. Kilby, were discharged today for lack of evidence in the case they were arrested on July 2, charged with obtaining sales subscriptions to the Hapgood Sales company through misrepresentation. Assistant District Attorney McNish said the evidence was not sufficient to hold the men on a nominal charge.

### FRUIT COMPANY DIVIDEND.

New York, July 10.—Stockholders of the United Fruit company at their meeting at Jersey City today approved the declaration of an extra dividend of 10 per cent, payable on August 1. They voted also to increase the capital stock of the company from \$20,000,000 to \$25,000,000.

### BATTLE WITH MOONSHINERS.

Hindman, Ky., July 10.—In a battle between revenue officers and a gang of moonshiners near here yesterday Bud Hall, alleged leader of the moonshiners, was killed and two others were badly hurt. No officer was injured. This is the second battle in a week, one moonshiner having been wounded in the previous fight.

### TO REACH AGREEMENT.

East Port, Me., July 10.—The British and American commissioners appointed in conformity with a treaty between Great Britain and the United States to investigate conditions and reach a preliminary code of statutes governing the international food fisheries between the two countries, arrived today to begin their work.

# DEPARTS WITH REGRET.

## Venezuelan Charge Has Found It Pleasant at Washington.

Washington, July 10.—Mr. Veloz-Goliticco, the Venezuelan charge at Washington, whose withdrawal from the legation here at the direction of President Castro was announced, is making hurried arrangements to leave for Venezuela. The former charge will leave his family here pending his future official status, which will be settled following an interview with President Castro after he reaches Venezuela. Mr. Veloz-Goliticco leaves Washington with a great deal of regret, and his good-byes to his friends indicated a depth of feeling in parting from the many pleasant associations he has made in Washington.

Lack of sufficient passenger accommodations on the steamer which sails from New York caused a change in the plans of Senator Veloz, the retiring Venezuelan charge. In consequence he will remain in Washington over night and go to New York tomorrow, with the expectation of sailing for Lagunaira about the middle of next week.

### SHERMAN WILL RETIRE.

#### Is to Give Up Place on Congressional Committee.

Washington, July 10.—Representative James S. Sherman, candidate for vice president on the Republican ticket, in a short time will retire from the Republican congressional committee, of which he is the chairman.
