

# BIG IRON WORKS FOR SALT LAKE

### Western Sheet & Structural Iron Co. Organized With \$150,000 Capital Stock.

### HAS A SPLENDID FIELD PLANS TO FILL LARGE CONTRACTS NOW SENT EAST.

A unique enterprise was set on foot yesterday by Charles H. Henderson, president of the Salt Lake Construction company, and several other business men. They will organize the Western Sheet & Structural Iron Works company to do the \$1,800,000 worth of work which now goes to eastern concerns every year. The company will manufacture the material to be used in the construction of its plant, and will also make nearly all of the needed machinery right here in Salt Lake.

Preparations were made yesterday afternoon at a conference in the office of Charles H. Henderson, president of the Salt Lake Construction company, in the Atlas block, for the making of an important addition to the multiplying industries of Salt Lake. Mr. Henderson and his associates decided to organize the Western Sheet & Structural Iron Works company, with a capital stock of \$150,000. Articles of incorporation will at once be prepared and filed with the secretary of state.

A site for the new plant has already been purchased in the southwestern part of Salt Lake. At yesterday's conference Mr. Henderson acted as chairman, the officers of the new corporation not yet having been chosen. Others present were Frank Simmons, an eastern investor, who will supply a portion of the needed capital; G. S. Barr, a contractor, formerly with the Keystone Bridge company, and Frank A. Fafek, proprietor of the Salt Lake Cornice & Roofing works.

At the close of the conference it was announced that the work of constructing the new plant will probably commence within forty days.

#### Orders Now Go East.

Mr. Simmons stated that the Salt Lake iron works would be the largest plant of the kind between Chicago and Salt Lake. It is the intention of the business men of the enterprise to do much of the work which is now being done by eastern concerns. "Every year," said Mr. Simmons, "orders which aggregate more than \$1,500,000 are sent east, which could be filled more quickly and more satisfactorily right here in Salt Lake, as you have here the best workmen in the sheet metal and structural iron line in the world."

When the plant is completed, the men interested in the company propose to supply all the structural iron required by builders in Salt Lake and throughout the regions surrounding the city, and to furnish material for mining and power companies.

In the beginning between thirty and forty men will be employed, but this number will be increased as the new industry develops.

#### Will Make Its Own Plant.

One unique feature of the Western Sheet & Structural Iron Works company will be that the concern will manufacture all of the material needed for the construction of the building it is to occupy, and will also make nearly all of the machinery to be used.

Mr. Simmons is an inventor and owns several valuable patents. As far as possible, the machinery of the plant will be made according to Mr. Simmons' patents, but as a few machines of other inventors will be needed, these will be purchased in the east.

By making its own machinery, with a few unimportant exceptions, the company expects to save about \$50,000. The plant, as planned, will cost about \$100,000. If the machinery and material for the iron works building were purchased

in the east, it is said, the cost would be at least \$150,000. Mr. Henderson and his associates decided to organize the company after making a careful study of the situation in Salt Lake. They say that there is absolutely no doubt that there is at present an abundance of work in Salt Lake and in the surrounding mining and smelter towns to make the new industry profitable from the start.

#### Recent Large Orders.

In the course of their investigations, they learned that among the large orders which have been sent east during the past few months, because Salt Lake lacked a plant equipped to do the work, were the following: United States Smelting & Refining company, bag house at smelter, \$100,000.

Telluride Power company, \$45,000. Garfield Smelter and Utah Consolidated company, \$200,000. Yampa smelter, \$62,000.

United States Mining company, tramway, \$18,000. There were other large orders and numerous small orders ranging from \$10,000 downward, all of which could be filled by a Salt Lake concern with the proper equipment, according to Mr. Henderson and his associates.

"But the opening of our plant will do more than give work to the men we employ and bring profits to those interested in the enterprise," said Mr. Simmons. "There will be much incidental work for other Salt Lake concerns, foundries, machine shops and even blacksmiths, although we will, of course, be prepared to do most of our own blacksmithing. The eastern concerns which at present fill the orders in our line from Salt Lake give this incidental work to concerns in the cities in which they are located. We will give all of it to local firms.

#### Allied Interests Represented.

"Among our stockholders will be the proprietors of a machine shop, of a mining machinery supply house, of a hardware establishment and of other concerns, who understand the great value our industry will prove to them.

"We will make as much of our own machinery as we can without conflicting with patents owned by other concerns.

"Right now there is plenty of business to keep us profitably employed, with the prospect of a vast increase in business as Salt Lake and the surrounding country advance. Every year the large orders for sheet and structural iron and other material which we will be able to supply aggregate \$1,200,000, and the small orders will aggregate \$800,000 more. That makes a total of \$1,900,000. We propose to do that work here in Salt Lake."

#### BREAKING BUCKING HORSES

##### The Science of Broncho Busting to Be Exemplified With Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show.

It will be interesting to lovers of horse flesh in all varieties to learn that there will be a display of broncho-busting during the progress of the exhibition, when Buffalo Bill and his big organization appear in this city. The art of broncho-busting has engaged the most daring members of the cowboy fraternity since the days when cowboys were first an established necessity in some features of the wild horse of the plains and the master hand which has attempted his subjection.

There need be no fear but that the broncho-busting in Buffalo Bill's Wild West show will be an exact reproduction of the original article, for it will be the genuine thing, and every time a cowboy mounts his horse he will take a great deal of trouble to make the horse as comfortable as possible. The cowboys will be real cowboys brought from the western wilds, where they have plied their avocation of heading and breaking bronchos all their lives. The world is seeing practically the last of this picturesque type of Americans, for the fencing of the ranges is fast going away with their occupation.

It has never been fully explained just why a broncho bucks, but many different theories have, of course, been advanced. It is said by some that they buck because of nervousness; by others because of fear, others genuine cunning, and this theory is the most generally accepted. The methods they employ largely vary, but are generally along certain lines of bodily contortion. They will jump into the air and land on all four feet stiff-legged; some will jump to the left and then quickly to the right, some half turning in their flight and always kicking, snorting and bucking.

The cowboy retains his seat by his stirrup hold; he withstands the swaying motion by moving his body and he at all times urges the horse to run, for only then can he be said to be in any measure under control. The horse uses all methods to dislodge his rider, and if he succeeds, he is always thereafter far more difficult to control than though he had never felt a saddle.

In Buffalo Bill's exhibitions there are employed no theatrical device of training to impel the bronchos to buck. They buck of their own free will and are evidently glad to do it. They have been picked from hundreds of buckers of the west, and are experts in the uncomfortable art of making themselves disagreeable to those who attempt to ride them. One of the later developments of the Wild West organization is the introduction of cowgirls to perform, in a certain degree, the difficult feat of making a bucking horse submit to their mastery. These girls are experts, too, and like all other features with Buffalo Bill's organization they are genuine types of western character; real, true to life, practical cowgirls.

#### FOUND FATHER'S GRAVE.

##### Search of Utah Man for Parent Missing for Eight Months.

(Special to The Herald.) Roanoke, Va., Aug. 22.—W. E. Treble, a real estate man of Green River, Utah, came here last night in search of his father, Alfred Treble, who disappeared from the old soldier's home at Johnson City, Tenn., eight months ago. The son has searched seven months and traveled thousands of miles trying to locate the missing veteran. The search led him to the Roanoke almshouse today, where he found his parent's grave. The father came to Roanoke a week after leaving the soldier's home. He was taken ill and carried to the poorhouse, where he died.

# RAILWAYS FILE THEIR ANSWER

### Southeastern Roads Deny Jurisdiction of Interstate Commerce Commission.

### RATE INCREASE NECESSARY BUSINESS POOR AND HIGH WAGES PAID.

Washington, Aug. 22.—The railroad companies operating in the southeastern territory today filed their answer before the interstate commerce commission to complaints which have been brought against the advance in rates on grain and grain products from Ohio river crossing to the southeast.

In connection with this answer the railroads filed a motion and demurrer to strike out of the complaints certain allegations with regard to the Southeastern Freight association and similar associations being a combination in restraint of trade and in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law. The grounds for the motion are, first, that the interstate commerce commission has frequently ruled that it has no jurisdiction to administer the Sherman anti-trust law, that the law being solely a matter for the action of the courts. Second, that the interstate commerce commission has ruled that a rate may be reasonably low or, indeed, unreasonably low, even though it be the result of an illegal combination.

#### Disorganized Commerce.

The railroads allege in the present instance that while the order of Judge Epitery Soper of Georgia was in force from Aug. 1 to Aug. 5, giving a lower rate to shippers in Georgia than to those in any other state in the southeastern territory, the effect was to demoralize and disorganize trade and commerce. The railway companies take the position that this is a demonstration of the fact that such associations as the Southeastern Freight association are absolutely necessary to prevent demoralization of commerce and that they promote trade instead of retarding it. The defendants allege that their recent increase of rates has not suppressed competition and that the same competition exists as heretofore. They deny that the territory north of the Ohio and west of the Mississippi river is dominated by any traffic association which fixes or maintains freight rates or suppresses competition or restrains interstate trade.

#### Not Entitled to Lower Rates.

The railroads deny that commodities involved in their increase of rates are entitled to lower rates than other commodities or that the advance was other than small and reasonable, and declare that the increase will not seriously or at all disturb existing trade relations or injure the consuming public. They deny that the margin of profit obtained by the dealer will not permit him to absorb the entire advance in rates or that the consuming public will be forced to bear any portion of the additional charge represented by an increase in the price. The directors deny that the increase will restrict the volume of traffic, and declare that it is not even a sufficient compensatory charge to fairly meet the cost in value of the service performed by them. They claim that while the net rates of some of the roads have in recent months shown some advance, yet taking all of the months together the net earnings, as well as gross earnings, have shown a very large diminution since Feb. 1, 1905.

#### Wages Increased.

They declare that the wages of their employees have been increased and that prices of all articles necessary for the maintenance and equipment of their lines are higher, that the demand of the public for efficiency of service has become more and more exacting and that they have been compelled to meet an increased and most costly demand for safe, prompt and efficient service. Since November, 1907, the traffic has decreased, decreasing their gross revenues enormously, while they have been obliged to maintain the high scale of wages and to pay high prices for all material and supplies. The railroads aver that there is no

alternative left to them except to advance their rates in order to pay their employees. They say the development of the south depends upon an increase rather than a decrease of their efficiency.

#### CITY HEALTH FOR A WEEK.

Fifty-four Births and Thirteen Deaths Reported to Authorities.

According to the weekly report of the department of health there were fifty-four births and but thirteen deaths the past week. The male sex had all the best of it, as of the births thirty-one were boys and of the deaths six were males. There were nineteen cases of contagious diseases reported, as follows: Smallpox, three; diphtheria, three; whooping cough, eight; typhoid fever, three. At the end of the week three houses remained in quarantine because of smallpox, three on account of scarlet fever and five because of diphtheria.

#### FOR COUNTY RECORDER.

License Assessor Seeks "American" Nomination.

Samuel I. Godman, city license assessor, yesterday announced his candidacy for the "American" nomination for county recorder. Since Jan. 1 last Mr. Godman has had charge of the license department of the city and has made a reputation for himself by his insistence that the ordinances governing these matters be enforced to the letter. He says that he believes his chances for the nomination are good and he is relying on his record.
