# FARMER GRANT COULDN'T BEAT

## Murray Gives Him Good Support and White Wings Lost, 7 to 2.

**BASEBALL TODAY.**  
The Occidental baseball team meets at the Murray team at Walker's field at 2:30 o'clock. Salt Lake meets Ogden at Ogden at 2 o'clock. This will be the Occidental's first game since their visit through Idaho, and they expect to make a good showing. Murray has gained great confidence in its ability during the past week and look for a victory over the Occidentals today.

Farmer Grant, the pride of Bountiful, the L. D. S. U. Wandamere and several of the other semi-amateur teams around this neck of the woods, has joined the Murray aggregation and thereby hangs a tale. Mr. Grant did his first work on the rubber for the smelter town yesterday and Salt Lake goes a peg down in the percentage column as a result. The score was 7 to 2. It was Murray's first game since the smelter boys became famous by beating the Luxus team and they have become ambitious to win the pennant.

Grant received good support from the Murray team and had the game well in hand from the start. He had excellent control and had the Salt Lake batters guessing on his different slants and shots. In the fourth inning he retired the side by ranning the three men who faced him. In the fifth the first two up also fanned, making five straight that went down before the smelter boys. The fans in the stand were mean enough to say that Empire West helped Grant out along about this time, but the smelter boys were not far wrong. However, he was pitching ball as the time away.

Deane was on the rubber for Salt Lake and did fairly well. Murray was lucky in bunching hits about the same time the White Wings were pulling off a few errors and the combination piled up the runs against them.

The fielding of Fuchell in middle was the feature of the game.

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# GOOD GAMES WON BY PIRATES

## Pittsburg and Brooklyn Go Seventeen Innings to 1 to 0 Score.

Pittsburg, Aug. 22—Pittsburg won the greatest baseball game ever played in this city from Brooklyn today, 1 to 0. The contest lasted seventeen innings, which breaks all records for extra inning games in this city, and equals the national league record for "1 to 0" games made by Chicago and Boston, in 1901. The world's record for a similar contest is eighteen innings made by Providence and Detroit, in 1882.

Neither stopped the game today in the second inning, but play was resumed in twenty-five minutes on an extremely wet field, and a couple of innings were played in rather a heavy rain.

Young and Pastorius each pitched a splendid game. Both were strong with men on bases. Thomas saved the game for the home team in the thirteenth inning by a long throw to the plate from center field, catching Pastorius. The winning run scored on a sacrifice bunt by Young, the third man up, singled and went to third on a single by Thomas. Pastorius passed Leach, filling the bases. Nozier at bat for the first time knocked a Texas League over second base, bringing in Young. Score: Pittsburg, 1; Brooklyn, 0.

Then Lasker made a dangerous attack on the king side, which threatened to enclose his opponent, who, however, carefully staved off all onslaughts. Dr. Tarrasch's 6th game a sharp double castle attack and succeeded in capturing a pawn in passing. Interest in the game lasted until Lasker resigned on the forty-fifth move. Dr. Lasker has won two games in the match.

As a result a number of good "water dogs" are being developed. While the state cannot yet furnish a man who is able to compete in the big eastern water carnivals, yet there are many promising youngsters who improve each year.

One of the objects of the tournament is to interest swimmers outside of the association. There are a number of such who have gained their knowledge of the art in the rivers, lakes and ponds around the state, and they are anxious to be introduced to these to get in and compete with the men who have learned the game in the tanks of the Y. M. C. A. It gives the swimmers a chance to see how good they are, as all times made in the races are accurate and can be compared with the world's records.
