ORE BODIES ARE GROWING BIGGER

Lower Mammoth's Recent Strike Now Ten Feet Wide—Gold Values Fading.

Reports from the Lower Mammoth property yesterday indicated that the recent big strike was holding out splendidly. As indicated in the first report from Superintendent Brown, the high-grade streak is widening as raising progresses. Yesterday the streak was ten feet wide, with the silver and lead values holding strong and the gold values evidently gradually diminishing, just as Superintendent Brown declared he thought would be the case when the sensational assays were obtained. The gold is still in evidence to the amount of several ounces per ton, but the chances seem to favor the idea that another great stope of good silver-

NORTH BUTTE HIGH ENOUGH

George L. Walker Discusses Butte Bonanza in Plain, but Unpopular, Fashion.

North Butte is declared to be producing a little more than 4,000,000 pounds of copper monthly, at a cost of 7 1/2 cents per pound, and to be earning approximately \$7 per share on its stock, or about 8 per cent on its present selling price, says George L. Walker in the Boston Commercial. A continuation of the present rate of earnings depends upon the ability of the management to operate the company's single shaft to its maximum capacity 365 days in the year. It does not allow for accidents or interruptions of any kind. The only prospect of an increase in North Butte's earnings is dependent upon an advance in the price of copper.

MINING STOCK EXCHANGE.

Market Gained Some of Its Lost Strength During the Day.

The market looked a little better yesterday, and a number of the weak spots were strengthened, most likely through the medium of supporting orders. Consolidated advanced from \$12 1/2 to \$13 1/2, while Lower Mammoth, which was down to \$12 1/2 this morning, closed at \$12. All these things helped to steady prices, but there is really nothing tangible on the ground to sustain upward movement at this time.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 9.—In spite of the continued strength in the copper market, especially in Erie, the coppers were dull and inclined to sag. Conservative judges do not see any reason for a bull movement, but, on the other hand, it does not seem prudent to sell stocks short, as they are very well held, and eventually will sell much higher.
