

INDICATE END OF COAL STRIKE

Wyoming Reports Say Settlement Has Been Reached at Diamondville.

Reports from Wyoming indicate that the coal strike will soon be settled. A prominent Salt Lake coal dealer received a long distance telephone message from Diamondville, near Kemmerer, Wyo., stating that the striking miners had returned to work in the Diamondville mines yesterday morning, but that the men employed at the Union Pacific railroad's mines were still out.

Coal dealers here are very optimistic over the situation. They believe that the trouble in all of the Wyoming coal mining camps will be settled before the end of the week.

The Diamondville camp is one of the largest in Wyoming. The mines there are owned by the Amalgamated Copper company and the coal is used in supplying the smelter at Anaconda, Mont. It is believed that if the Amalgamated Copper company has been successful in reaching an understanding with its men, the Union Pacific railroad and other corporations will also be soon able to reach a settlement of the trouble.

The news of the approaching end of the strike will be cheering information throughout a wide region west and north of Salt Lake, where the pinch of the coal scarcity has already been severely felt. It is said that in some of the mining camps of the intermountain region the supplies of fuel have been exhausted and that some companies have been compelled to temporarily suspend operations.

DIRECTOIRE GOWNS WORN BY LIVING MODELS ATTRACT CROWDS

A new departure in the line of fashions and fashion display was inaugurated in Salt Lake yesterday when the Keith-O'Brien company introduced the novel idea of living models to display their winter stock. The custom is really a necessity in this age, for the departures in fashion for the season are so radical, the gowns so extremely different from those of the past five years, that unless one sees them on the living, moving models it is hard to adapt oneself to the new idea.

The news that living models were to parade the shop spread rapidly and the advertising managers decided that the men were good readers of the Sunday papers. A goodly number of callow youths presented themselves on the upper floor in the early hours of the day, but seeing nothing of a sensational nature, and being unable to appreciate the beauties of the garments shown, they departed with a disappointed air. Not so the women, however. They thronged the store from early till the closing hour and many were their exclamations of wonder and admiration.

The extreme gowns are the modified directoire, the handsome clinging garments made famous by the 18th, slender forms of the French women. Three handsome models displayed the gowns, changing with good effect from street toilette to evening gown, and from that to handsome reception affairs, and wearing the most suitable with each—or as is the case of a new evening wrap—the hood.

All the gowns show the decided long slender lines of the skirt, with no visible waist line. All have the exaggerated length of sleeve, in some cases reaching well over the knuckles, and all are stately in marked degree.

Some amusing incidents were recorded by those who remained long enough to enjoy all the sensations. One woman, a well known wit, was admiring a directoire of the modified type when she turned to the clerk and asked:

"Where do you have the tights to go with this?"

With the air of one surprised if not injured the clerk replied:

And the only real directoire gown—that is the only one which will create a sensation of the kind anticipated—was sold the day it reached the shop.

POLICE COURT GLIMPSES

That was the query which William Johnson made in his defense in the city court yesterday. He had pleaded his innocence of the charge, and was endeavoring to show the court that it would belittle a man's capacity to let such an insignificant amount of "red-eye" conquer him.

Judge Diehl smiled and let William train his batteries on Officer Emil Johnson, who was in for a bunch of sympathy because the minion of the law owned up to the same family name.

"I've seen men go under on less than that. You certainly were ready for the court, though."

Such was the stern rebuff which Patrolman Johnson gave William Johnson. It was entirely unexpected. However, William was resourceful, and began new tactics by launching forth on an oratorical flight in defense of the American citizen's tank capacity.

SHORT MAKES DENIAL.

Says He Was Misquoted in Report of Cincinnati Sermon.

"The statement which reached this city that I had compared Salt Lake to Sodom and Gomorrah, had declared it worse than Atlantic City, N. J., and predicted that in five years it will be utterly destroyed, is absolutely untrue."
