

NEGROES SCORE TAFT AND TEDDY

Leading Writers and Editors of Colored Race in Convention at Pittsburg.

Pittsburg, Oct. 15.—The Eastern and Interstate Negro Press convention, being held in the John Wesley A. M. E. Zion church this week, has brought to this city over 100 of the leading negro editors and writers of the eastern, middle and southern states.

The declaration of principles says: "We hold in kind memory our friends, from Phillips and Lovejoy to Lincoln and Grant, and the others, but the one who stands today for our cause as champion and martyr is Joseph Benson Foraker of Ohio, who in the face of public opinion has dared to uphold the principles of right and not party, whose political future is jeopardized by his own party for being on our side, and fighting to sustain the rules and justice."

The resolutions in part follow: "We as loyal American citizens do hereby voice a protest against the treatment our people receive at the hands of the prejudiced whites, and particularly the recent riots in Springfield, Ill. We regret that such strained relations should have existed, but we advise the framers of our Government to be just in their efforts to suppress the riot and to bring to justice the one guilty of mob violence. Such men who attempt to carry out the law should be kept in office."

"We call upon the negro voters of Ohio to first support Joseph Benson Foraker, our champion, and particularly the United States senate and ever afterward to any position to which he aspires. And we call upon the negro voters of the country who have a spark of manhood left to show their disapproval of the present incumbent of the office who will not if Taft is elected, and to William H. Taft for his unprincipled character, which we believe will be detrimental to our people if given an opportunity, by working ardently for the defeat of Mr. Taft."

ONCE TAUGHT IN SALT LAKE

Antonio Muzzarelli, Prominent Educator, Commits Suicide.

New York, Oct. 15.—Antonio Muzzarelli, aged 41, a veteran of the French admiralty and prominent in this country and abroad as an educator and a writer, committed suicide today at his home here by shooting himself in the chest with a revolver.

Mr. Muzzarelli, whose real name was Jules Caesar Venocasio Emanighio, was a native of France. At the age of 23 he entered the French army. He served through the Franco-German war and in Paris against the communists, who twice imprisoned him. Later he became active in politics with Gambetta, was president of the Democratic committee in Paris and was sent to prison for public political manifestation. He came to the United States in 1877 and since that time had been engaged in teaching modern languages and literature and in writing.

In 1906 he was made an officer d'academie by decree of the French government for distinguished services in the cause of education.

Muzzarelli several years ago taught languages in the high school. Since he left Salt Lake he has been entirely lost sight of.

EXPLOSION OF DYNAMITE Six Men Killed, One Fatally Injured and Twenty Others Badly Hurt Near Fort Collins, Colo. If you then call his attention to the fact that Mr. Taft is pledged, through his platform, to the establishment of postal savings banks in this country, he will shrug his shoulders and say, "If I honestly believe that he does not believe that any serious effort will be made on behalf of that reform in the event of Mr. Taft's election. Yet that man will vote for Taft, with the distinct belief that he is deliberately attempting to deceive the American people and trick them out of their vote."

No Confidence in Taft Pledges. "Taking a broader and more patriotic view of the question than that suggested by mere selfishness which candidate is the safer man for the people, the man who proposes to conscientiously keep his word and carry out his pre-election pledges, or the man who subscribes to pledges and policies which he has no thought of carrying out if elected? "Laying aside all questions of patriotism for the moment, and considering only the moral aspect of the question, every good citizen will agree that he is for the candidate who proposes to keep his word with the people."
