PRICES LIFTED IN WALL STREET

Many Issues Traded in, but a Few Constituted the Bulk of the Business.

MORE POLITICAL RUMORS UNCERTAINTY OVER WHICH WAS SAID TO HAVE EXISTED.

New York, Oct. 21.—The aggressive operations to lift prices of stocks which commenced in volume yesterday were continued energetically today, with no new development as a basis for the movement. The number of shares transferred had risen by noon to a total as large as the aggregate for the whole day yesterday.

Some of the rumors in circulation to account for the day's advances had to do with individual properties, but the mainstay of the speculation was the rumor mysterious allusions to important developments in the political field, which were regarded as releasing the speculation from some of the bonds of uncertainty which have held it. The expression is quite universal in Wall street of the feeling that promptly with the passing of the elections there is to be an outburst of public demand for securities for investment.

GRAIN AND PROVISIONS. Chicago, Oct. 21.—Wheat opened firm, with prices a shade to 1/4 to 3/4 higher than the previous close. The market was bullishly affected by modern advances in the price of wheat at the principal European grain elevators and by Argentine advances which claimed damage to the new crop by recent frosts. A number of leading commission houses pounded the market the first few minutes of trade and this resulted in a quick decline of nearly half a cent. Then the market suddenly was bare, and prices advanced as rapidly as they had previously declined. Throughout the remaining session a firm tone prevailed and the market closed strong at almost the top notch. The news from Argentina was the chief factor, although a number of other influences tended to the buying. One dispatch claimed that the injury to the Argentine crop would amount to 5 per cent

of the total crop. Rains were reported in some sections of the winter wheat belt, but the wet weather was still not so general as had been forecasted. The official prediction, however, was for rain extending from the Missouri river eastward to the Ohio river. News from the northwest was of a bullish character. Corn was weak during the part of the session, but regained a large part of the loss late in the day. Shorts were fairly active bidders for corn late in the day, and this caused the December market to close firm. May was steady and July weak. Trade in oats was dull. Cash options were steady to 1/2 lower. The close was strong, with prices up 1/4 to 1/2 per cent. Provisions were active. At the close prices were up 10 to 45. The leading futures ranged as follows:
