

TOTAL SMASH OF THE FISH TRUST

Concern Can Only Pay Thirty-five Cents on the Dollar—Will Not Be Reorganized.

Chicago, Nov. 20.—At a meeting of the creditors' committee bankers, held behind closed doors in the Corn Exchange National bank of Chicago yesterday, the question was seriously discussed, it is said, of asking the state's attorney to use his judgment in laying the failure of A. Booth & Co., known as the "fish trust," before the Cook county grand jury. This is a decision of criminal action, it is said, inasmuch as a final audit of the company's assets which showed that the creditors would receive, it is claimed, only 25 cents on the dollar.

The audit was started shortly after the "fish trust" was thrown into the hands of a receiver about three months ago.

The receivership disclosed the fact that the bank held \$2,000,000 of the corporation's paper. Some of the bankers, it is said, declared it will be impossible to reorganize the corporation, as desired by W. Vernon Scott, and assert they are willing to accept the 25 cents on the dollar rather than allow a reorganization of the sinking fund to pay off the indebtedness of nearly \$3,000,000.

E. A. Hamill, president of the Corn Exchange National bank, who acted as chairman of the bankers' advisory committee; Alexander Robertson, vice president of the Continental National bank; Frank O. Wetmore, second vice president of the First National bank; East Van Vechten, vice president of the Commercial National bank; Attorney Jacob Newman, representing the bankers' committee, and personal attorneys of the various banks, besides Receiver W. J. Chalmers and his attorney, John J. Herrick.

DIVORCE SUITS IN NEVADA KANSAS BANK GOES UNDER

One From New Jersey and One From New York—Parties Said to Be Wealthy.

Reno, Nev., Nov. 20.—Mrs. Minnie Lister of Hoboken, wife of George T. Lister, a wealthy financier of Patterson, N. J., and a heavy stockholder in the Vacuum Renovation company of New York, filed her suit for divorce last night. She admits the marriage at Patterson in 1890 and admits the issue of a son, now 15 years old, but denies all the charges of extreme cruelty. Lister alleged that his wife accused him of infidelity, threatening to kill him and herself, all of which he claims made him miserable and resulted in a complete nervous breakdown. By stipulation of attorneys, Judge Pike ordered Lister to pay his wife \$30 and counsel fees pending the action, also that Mrs. Lister's deposition be taken at Hoboken for use in the trial.

First National of Fort Scott, an Old Institution, in the Hands of Receiver.

Washington, Nov. 20.—Comptroller of the Currency Murray today appointed James D. Bradley, bank examiner, as receiver of the First National bank of Fort Scott, Kan. This action was taken upon receipt of a telegram from President Hornaday asking that a receiver be appointed owing to the run on the bank which has lasted two days. The bank has a capital of \$100,000, and, according to the last report, had a surplus of \$25,000.

Fort Scott, Kan., Nov. 20.—The First National bank of Fort Scott, one of the oldest banks in the state, closed its doors this morning. The bank had deposits of \$702,000. The closing followed a run on the bank yesterday, when depositors withdrew \$56,000. Grant Hornaday, the president, in a statement issued today, stated that the failure was the result of malicious reports spread by enemies of the bank. He said that the bank's assets exceeded the liabilities by \$27,000, and that the depositors would be paid in full. The depositors number about two thousand, many of them small merchants. A crowd of depositors gathered about the bank building this morning, but there was no demonstration.
