DEATH CLAIMS E. A. HITCHCOCK

Former Cabinet Member Succumbs After an Illness of Several Weeks.

STORMY CAREER IN OFFICE

F. MARION CRAWFORD, THE NOVELIST, ALSO DEAD.

Washington, April 9.—Ethan Allan Hitchcock, secretary of the interior under Presidents McKinley and Roosevelt, died here this morning at 11 o'clock, aged 74. He had been critically ill for several days and had been ill for some weeks. He contracted a severe cold while in the west, and his condition became so serious that he hurried to Washington to place himself in the hands of specialists who had attended him during his official career here. He suffered from a combination of kidney, heart and pulmonary diseases. His condition had been steadily growing worse during the last two days, and last night all hope for his recovery was abandoned.

Inserted the Probe.
His passing marked the close of a career whose pre-eminent feature was an administration of the interior department that stirred the western land problems as never before.

Brought here from St. Petersburg, where he had served as ambassador under an appointment of President McKinley, Mr. Hitchcock was almost immediately plunged into a vortex of complications growing out of vast fraud and counter-charges growing out of the acquisition of public lands in the western states. Mr. Hitchcock directed the most sweeping investigations, arousing the enmity of powerful political interests. That recalled today is one of the most unswerving and relentless inquisitions in the annals of government prosecutions.

Prosecuted Public Men.
He prosecuted cases against numerous men in public life and private business, including United States Senator Mitchell of Oregon, who was convicted and died not long afterwards; former Congressman Binger Herman, who had served as commissioner of the general land office, and who was acquitted; former United States Senator Dietrich of Nebraska; Representative Williamson of Oregon and John A. Benson, a millionaire real estate broker of San Francisco.

Mr. Hitchcock was a target of attack on the floors of congress and in protests filed at the White House. The Hitchcock family was well known in Washington, where he frequently entertained at smart functions.
At the bedside when the end came were Mrs. Hitchcock, the two daughters, Lieutenant Commander Sims and a nephew, George C. Hitchcock of St. Louis. The body will be taken to St. Louis tomorrow, arriving there Sunday night. The funeral will be held Monday, the interment being at the Bellefontaine cemetery in that city.

Taft Sends Condolences.

President Taft today sent to Mrs. Hitchcock the following letter of condolence: "My Dear Mrs. Hitchcock: The sad news of the death of your husband has just come. Mrs. Taft and I extend to you and your family our sincerest sympathy in your great loss. Your husband's record for honesty and high sense of official duty, deeply impressed upon the country by his efficient conduct of the interior department and his dignified and able representation of this country abroad. The gratitude of his fellow citizens and the high respect for his memory may, in time, I hope, mitigate the intensity of your present sorrow. Sincerely yours, WILLIAM H. TAFT."

F. Marion Crawford.

Sorrento, Italy, April 9.—F. Marion Crawford, the novelist, died here at 7:50 this evening. He was born in 1845.

William Fitzhugh Whitehouse.

Lenox, Mass., April 8.—The death of William Fitzhugh Whitehouse, a well known retired capitalist of New York, at Beaulieu, in the south of France, today was announced here.

NEW CORPORATIONS.

The University Investment company, organized in Salt Lake for the purpose of conducting a general real estate, stock and loan business, filed articles of incorporation yesterday. The capital is \$20,000 in dollar shares, of which 2,500 remains in the treasury. Charles B. Stewart is president; Fred A. Anderson, vice president; J. Taylor, secretary and treasurer. These, with Katherine R. Stewart and Leonora C. Stewart, constitute the directors. The company takes over for \$35,500 the University dormitory and the property on which it is located, in lot 5, block 25, plat F, Salt Lake City survey. The Randolph Utility & Power company, organized to supply power for public and private enterprises in Rich county, as well as in Idaho, Montana and Wyoming, incorporated yesterday. Capital is \$200,000 in dollar shares, and a permit from the state to appropriate 18 cubic second feet of water from Big creek, Rich county, is taken over from A. E. Wing for \$50. John Kennedy is president; J. F. Spencer, vice president; A. E. Wing, secretary, and these, with J. C. Gray, Thomas Wilson, Andrew Kennedy and Robert McKinnon, are the directors.
