

NEW MORMON ADMINISTRATION BUILDING



The new administration building of the Mormon church on upper Main street, now nearing completion, is a most attractive structure. Its dimensions are 123x58 feet. The building will be four stories in height, with a basement. The basement walls are of granite. Buff brick has been used in the construction, with trimmings of Wy-

oming sandstone. Cement and concrete have been used in making the structure fireproof. The interior is being finished throughout in quarter-sawn oak. Vaults for storing papers and records are being built in the basement. The presiding bishop's office will be on the main floor. The Relief society will have quarters on the second floor. The third floor will be devoted to the use of

the Mutual Improvement and Primary associations. The fourth floor will be arranged into an auditorium, reception and banquet rooms. The building will cost \$133,000, exclusive of electric wiring, plumbing and heating. The vault doors and elevators are the architect's, and W. J. Tuddenham is the general contractor.

NEWEST NOTES OF SCIENCE

Vienna will draw its new water supply from a point 129 miles away. Botanists record 152 kinds of flowers indigenous to the Arctic regions.

A new electric sandpapering outfit is one of the newest devices along that line. The University of Liverpool will confer the degree of doctor of laws upon William Marwood.

The United States produced gold worth \$26,312,256 last year, in comparison with \$24,525,460 the preceding year.

A preliminary survey of the route of the proposed Hudson Bay railway has disclosed between 220,000,000 and 330,000,000

feet of timber immediately along the right of way, with untold amounts suitable for structural material and wood pulp within easy reach.

Nearly 120,000 of English capital last year organized with English capital last year to exploit the mineral resources of Russia. The preventing of the sprouting of potatoes in storage by packing them in layers of cokes is being tried out in Germany.

The French court of appeals has ruled that the bleaching of flour is an improvement and not injurious to public health. In the last twenty years Germany has spent \$150,000,000 on her waterways and now has 8,725 miles of navigable rivers and canals.
