WANTS HER FREEDOM.

Mrs. Von Rookhuyzen Sues for Divorce and Alimony.

The brief married life of the Von Rookhuyzen has been anything but happy, according to a complaint of the wife filed in the district court yesterday. She asks for a divorce. The name of the plaintiff is Emily Chandler Von Rookhuyzen and that of her husband Joe Von Rookhuyzen. They were married in Ogden Oct. 2, 1897, and for the past year according to the complaint, the husband has been cruel, inhuman and violent. Even as late as June 15, he assaulted her, bounding her on the arms, shoulders and body. He became so violent that she was forced to call in the police and flee from her home. On the following day he assaulted her again, scratching and lacerating her arms and shoulders and tearing the dress from her body. There are two children born of the marriage—twins, a boy and a girl, 1 month of age. The wife is earning from \$16 to \$18 a week. The wife asks for divorce, custody of the children, the return of her maiden name, Emily Chandler, \$50 attorney's fee, \$25 a month temporary alimony, and a restraining order prevent the husband from disposing of the \$300 worth of personal property in the house, made up largely of wedding presents.

District Court Notes.

Alma Keyes was appointed guardian of Maria L. Stoddard, an incompetent person, yesterday, on the petition of Flora Keyes, and G. J. S. Abels was appointed guardian of Gerald G. Klomp, a minor.

An information was filed in the district court yesterday by District Attorney N. J. Harris against L. Rubenstein, charging him with embezzlement. Later the case against Rubenstein was dismissed by Judge J. A. Howell on the return by Rubenstein to his owner of the \$20 diamond ring involved in the case.

District Attorney N. J. Harris filed an information in the district court yesterday against W. D. Griffin, charging him with forgery. The case was presented to Judge J. A. Howell later in the day and Griffin pleaded guilty to the second count, that of passing a forged check for \$25. The first count, that of issuing the check, was dismissed. Griffin pleaded that he had a wife and little children, that this was his first offense, and that it was committed while he was under the influence of drink. He will be sentenced on Tuesday.

In probate court yesterday Nellie A. Perkins was appointed administrator of the estate of George L. Perkins.

Baptist Day in Ogden.

Dr. M. D. Eubank, Rev. Jacob Sallade, D. D., and Rev. J. P. Jacobs, three prominent ministers of the Baptist church, arrived in Ogden last evening and will speak from the pulpit of the Baptist church in this city today. There will be three meetings during the day—at 11:15 in the morning, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and at the usual hour in the evening. The meetings will be made more interesting by the presence of the Glee club of Delta college. It will sing at all the meetings.

Funeral of P. C. Koerner.

The body of Philip C. Koerner arrived from California on the Los Angeles Limited yesterday, and funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Monday at the home of Mrs. Hattie E. Wade, 314 Twenty-fourth street. They will be in charge of Rev. J. E. Carver, and Prof. Squire Cooper will have charge of the music. The Modern Woodmen will take part in the service. The body will be in state at Larsson's undertaking parlors from 1 o'clock this morning until 8 o'clock this evening, and on Monday at the home of Mrs. Wade.

Board of Education.

The county commissioners will sit as a board of equalization for the adjustment of taxes, Monday, Wednesday and Friday of next week, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, and all day Saturday. This will be the last opportunity for filing complaints for wrong assessments. The commissioners have increased the assessed valuation of the property in the county 30 per cent, except in Riverdale, where a special adjustment was made. There have been but few complaints.

A Japanese High Financier.

K. Seida, a Japanese contractor, has shown indications of becoming an American financier. Some time ago he took a contract for doing work for the Wasatch Canning company. He employed twenty-four other Japs as gardeners. Last night they all appeared at the city hall and complained that they had never received any money, and that \$1,500 was due them. It developed that the Seida had purchased goods right and left in the town.
