

BIG AUDIENCE AT TABERNACLE Listers to Sermon on Mormonism by Elder Nephi L. Morris. PRINCIPLES ARE DISCUSSED COMPARISONS ARE MADE OF VARIOUS BELIEFS IN DEITY.

Principles embodied in the belief of the Latter-day Saints were set forth in detail at the tabernacle, Sunday afternoon, by Nephi L. Morris, who was the speaker at the regular afternoon service. The audience was nearly as large as that of the preceding Sunday, when the place was filled to its capacity.

President William McClellan of Pioneer state opened the meeting by giving out the first hymn, "The Spirit of Prophecy," John R. Winder took charge. After a prayer by Joseph E. Taylor and a hymn by the tabernacle choir, Mr. Morris addressed the audience.

He called attention to the fact that Salt Lake, during the last week, had witnessed the greatest number of persons and the most sacred guests that ever had entertained. The speaker said the visitors had been very welcome and they had rendered a great service, in renewing within the hearts of the residents of the city a love of country.

Position Not Isolated. Mr. Morris said the position held by the Latter-day Saints is by no means an isolated one, but has been assumed by various peoples for many centuries. He said the use of a new revelation was felt by the reformers of the fifteenth century, and after reading from the confession of William Penn, called attention to the fourth sermon, to the effect that the real cause why the Latter-day Saints no longer appeared in the churches was that the Christians had turned heathen.

Second Part of Baptism. He said the receiving of the Holy Ghost is the second part of baptism, the Latter-day Saints believe in the ordinance of laying on of hands by those commissioned by the church. He mentioned the practice of laying on of hands in the most common of the Latter-day Saints in the household, for the healing of the sick, and mention also was made of the speaking in tongues.

Pre-Existence of Man. The pre-existence of man, as a spirit with God, in the spirit world, was another point to which reference was made, as well as the idea of the Latter-day Saints regarding hell, their belief being that it is a condition rather than a location, a condition of the soul, and that the contrary, is an abode of the exalted spirits who have come up through great tribulation.

FIRE PREVENTERS ABOUT \$1500 DAMAGE DONE FIREMAN ON FALLING TRUCK SUSTAINS BROKEN FOOT.

A fire, the origin of which is unknown, but which had been allowed a few minutes longer to burn unchecked, might have almost totally destroyed the city and county building, was discovered burning early Sunday morning in the chamber of the house of representatives of the city side of the building by N. P. Gray of No. 48 South Third East street. The fire broke out at about 10 o'clock and forty-five minutes, extinguished the fire. The damage to the building and contents amounted to about \$1500.

The fire had its origin on the city side of the building in the house of representatives. The exact cause of the fire will probably never be known, but it is thought to have been caused by a lighted match or a cigarette being thrown into the cuspidor, during the day there were a number of visitors at the building. The cuspidors are filled with dry sawdust, and it is supposed that the match, cigarette or cigar stump set fire to the sawdust. The fire smoldered along unnoticed.

The fire spread quickly. When the firemen reached the scene the flames were quickly spreading to the other part of the building. The doors of the building had been locked so that the firemen were unable to get on the inside of the building. The ladder track was pulled up alongside of the building and the ladder raised to the first man up the ladder. The beam of the ladder failed to fasten into the window sill, and when Fireman Malloy started up the cog slipped and the ladder fell, and sustained a fractured foot. Captain Eckman and Lieutenant Lorenz only escaped serious injury by dropping under the wagon.

Dr. F. B. Short Preaches on "The Fellowship of Mystery"

Dr. Francis Burdette Short delivered a stirring sermon at the First Methodist church Sunday morning before a large congregation, many G. A. R. men and tourists being present, taking as his subject: "The Fellowship of Mystery." He said in part, taking as his text Eph. iii: 9: "And to make all men see what is the fellowship of the mystery, which has been hid in God, who created all things by Jesus Christ."

"A mystery is that something which has been arbitrarily concealed, which may be sought after, and which may or may not be revealed or discovered. The earth, the air and the sea—all bulge with profound mystery. Human life is a veritable mystery, and every parent recognizes this as he watches the growth of the child. But the matchless mystery of the ages is the incarnation of God, who showed himself to men in the form of a man—the man Christ Jesus. This mystery is known, but is not comprehended. With it one may have and hold blessed fellowship, but can not fathom its blessed depths. Herein lies its ever-increasing charm.

Christian Life Not Theory. "The life of Christ is not theory, but fact. That it has greatly bewildered the world is because of irreconcilable differences among theologians. Each age has had its different schools of thought."
