## FIGURES SHOW BIG INCREASES TO SET HIMSELF RIGHT AT HOME

Reports of Attendances From Various Schools of Salt Lake Compiled.

MANY SINCE THE OPENING REFUTES CHARGES MADE NO PUPILS MAY ENTER AFTER OCT. 20.

An increase of nearly 1,000 pupils in the public schools of Salt Lake is shown by reports from the various buildings by Superintendent D. H. Christensen yesterday. The attendance for the second Tuesday of the school year is 15,239, as against 14,633 for last year and 14,517 for the year 1907-8. Miss Myrtle Kelly, secretary to Superintendent Christensen, was busy gathering the figures most of the afternoon, and in almost every school an increase is shown.

Owing to the redistricting of the city, the attendance at some of the schools which were crowded last year has dropped off some, so that the conditions this year are better for the teachers and a good deal better for the pupils.

During the week since last Tuesday, the opening day of the school year, the increase has been almost 1,300, as then there were 14,600. Children who have never attended school must enter this week or they will have to remain out of school until next year. The entrance of pupils in the first grade after the week of September 14th, when the work is fairly started makes no end of confusion, and the board has ruled that the beginners must enter school during the first two weeks or wait until the next school year.

This year has been made in regard to the promotions, as pupils with promotion slips must present them within the first two weeks of school or take the chance of having to pass examinations for the upper grades.

## Thirty Weeks Required.

For these reasons it is stated that the schools are now nearly as full as they will become. There will be a number of pupils who will remain out until October and enter then. The state law required thirty weeks of attendance in the public schools, and there will be just thirty weeks after Oct. 20. But if entrants wait until that time they will have no chance for absence through illness, as it would make it compulsory for them to take the examinations at the end of the year, no matter how high they stood in their classes, if less than thirty weeks' attendance was shown.

The greatest increase in attendance this year is shown at the High School, which had 1,215 students now attending, and will probably have 225 by the first of October. This is explained by the fact that many High school pupils have come to Salt Lake from other cities, and partly from the large graduation class of a year ago. The attendance at the High School a year ago was 1,160, and is now 1,215—an increase of nearly 200.

The work of the year will be laid out by Superintendent Christensen on the attendance up to date, without waiting until the largest enrollment is shown early in October. The difference will be great, and plans for the school work for the year will be based on the attendance at the present time. The figures on attendance for the last three years are as follows:

by rules of their own adoption and was guilty, if at all, of every item with which I was charged. One of these young ignoramus came to me for a list of the twenty-four chairmen of committees, and yet the full list was at the entrance, in large black letters, and had been there for months and had also been published in 20,000 booklets and in every newspaper of the city."

## Another Reporter.

"Another youngster," says Colonel Sterrett, "bearing broadly on his countenance the pellucid smile of semi-imbecility, asked me at what times the executive committee held their meetings. For an answer to such questions, these ducklings passed through the outer office, against the protest of those in charge, who could have answered fully and saved the interruption of my work."

In another place Colonel Sterrett says: "There were a few honorable and capable newspaper men acting as reporters in Salt Lake, but as a rule I have never come in contact with as great a paucity of brains as is represented in this calling in that city. I actually experienced nausea in my endeavor to consider them worthy of my attention."

## Newspapers of Salt Lake.

Colonel Sterrett refers at some length to the attitude shown toward him by the Salt Lake newspapers, saying that the morning papers treated him in a fair and honorable manner, but that the afternoon papers "have said some ugly and absolutely untruthful things" about him.

Colonel Sterrett said that when the very first of the afternoon papers came he endeavored to fix the time of noon to the reporters of the afternoon papers, and 8 p. m. for the morning papers. He says the reporters insisted on coming to his room, and that the fact that their inquiries could almost invariably have been answered by the office assistants.

"Working under a heavy strain," he says, "I was not as diplomatic and entered my office usually when reporters entered my office, and when they entered my office I was usually with them, and they were usually with me."

Colonel Sterrett calls attention to the fact that, at each encampment, he has drawn up and submitted to the local executive committee a set of rules and regulations for the government of that body, and says the rules adopted by the executive committee in Salt Lake consisted of thirty-six paragraphs.

## Shifts the Blame.

In the light of certain paragraphs in these rules, Colonel Sterrett, in his letter, examines into the various "charges" against his management, made in the articles to which the letter is a reply. He dismisses the "charge" in regard to "the grossest favoritism in the matter of letting contracts," by saying that the executive committee let all contracts.

In regard to statements that bidders for concessions had been misled and deceived, and that there was favoritism in the securing of bids for badges, he says the one concession let, for a souvenir book, was let to a person who had no charge of the letting of contract for badges.

Regarding "Charge 4," to the effect that "the little pieces of Colonel Sterrett, Belle Warner and Pansy Warner, were designated by prominent persons as being insulting, snappish and generally disagreeable," Colonel Sterrett's letter says:

"The people of Troy know these girls as refined and cultured young ladies, and know them incapable of being rude to persons who properly conducted themselves. When Miss Pansy was poked in the ribs by a lecherous old devil, with leering eyes, of course she resented it. The name of this old man will be given at the proper time and place, with the names of such eye-witnesses as were made the evidence in the case. I am sure that he was a member of the executive committee." Continuing his statements about some of the newspaper reports, Colonel Sterrett says:

"There was not an expert in any department of my work at Salt Lake, except my personal office force, and this expert help is being criticised and lied about by a \$15-a-week reporter, thoroughly ignorant of the fact that the executive committee even was governed
