



Reports of Attendances From Colonel Sterrett Tells Ohio Pa-Various Schools of Salt Lake Compiled.

Owing to the redistricting of the city, the attendance at some of the schools which were crowded last year has dropped off some, so that the conditions this year are better for the eachers and a good deal better for the

During the week since last Tuesday, ne opening day of the school year, the crease has been almost 1,300, as then there were 14,050. Children who have never attended school must enter this week or they will have to remain out of school until next year. The entrance of pupils in the first grade after the work is fairly started makes no end of confusion, and the board has ruled that the beginners must enter school during the first two weeks or wait until

the next school year. This rule has also been made in regard to the promotions, as pupils with promotion slips must present them within the first two weeks of school or take the chance of having to pass examinations for the upper grades.

Thirty Weeks Required.

For these reasons it is stated that the schools are now nearly as full as office, they will become. There will be a number of pupils who will remain out until October and enter then. The state required thirty weeks of attendin the public schoools, and there ill be just thirty weeks after Oct. 20. it if entrants wait until that time ey will have no chance for absences ugh illness, as it would make it mpulsory for them to take the exninations at the end of the year, no matter how high they stood in their asses, if less than thirty weeks' atndance was shown.

The greatest increase in attendance his year is shown at the High school, which has 1,315 students now attending. nd will probably have 325 by the first October. This is explained by the act that many High school pupils have ome to Sait Lake from other cities. and partly from the large graduation lasses a year ago. The attendance at a year ago was 1,160, and is now 1,315—an increase of nearly

Superintendent Christensen on the attendance up to date, without waiting early in October. The difference will not be great, and plans for the school work for the season 1909-10 will be based upon the attendance in the schools at the present time. The figures on attendance for the last three
