

MARS WIFE'S FACE WITH SOUP BOWLS

Three Unhappy Women Tell Stories of Cruel Deeds by Husbands.

Harrowing details of how brutal a husband can be are contained at length in three divorce actions filed in the district court yesterday.

George W. Collins is said to have married his wife's face with soup bowls and tea cups. Mary E. Collins says they were married at Anaconda, Mont., Dec. 31, 1889. She says he has been drunk most of the time for the last two years. She says he broke a soup bowl on her face, cutting a deep gash on her cheek. February last, she says, he threw a tea cup, hitting her above the left eye with it. Mrs. Collins says there are two children, May E. and Edward P. She wants their custody.

Sarah A. Leek says the climax to the many threats of John A. Leek came in June, 1908, when he knocked her to the floor and then menaced her with a butcher knife. They were married in Salt Lake on June 4, 1906. She wants the custody of her daughter, 10 months old.

Elen Peterson Williams says she was driven from home at 2555 South Fifth East street on the night of July 10, 1909, by Miles L. Williams. Then, she says, he sold the house and she had no home except with relatives. They were married here on June 28, 1907. Mrs. Williams asks for real estate belonging to her husband, valued at \$500, and for \$20 a month permanent alimony.

HAT COSTS FREEDOM.

Police Believe Prisoner Stole Clothing Here and at Ogden.

Explanations are in order on the part of Louis Beannour as to how he came into possession of two pairs of trousers he was attempting to sell to passersby at 139 Third West street yesterday afternoon, and why a hat he claims to have purchased in San Francisco, bears the mark of C. D. Ives & Co., Ogden. Beannour was arrested by Detectives Edward Janney and J. W. Burt and brought to the police station, where the trousers were identified as coming from the Nichol & Co. clothing store, South Main street. Clerks at Nichol Brothers had not missed the trousers, and did not remember having seen Beannour about the store. The trousers were both of the same size, showing that they had been taken from the top of a pile of clothing. A charge of robbery was docketed against Beannour. He insisted that his hat was purchased in Ogden.

ASK FOR WATER TO ENLARGE A CANAL

An application for the right to appropriate fifty cubic feet of water from Coal creek, in Iron county, Utah, was filed in the state engineer's office yesterday by William R. Palmer of Cedar City. The application states that it is proposed to enlarge the canal of John S. Woodbury, Jr., sufficient to carry the water asked for. Under this new project an area of 1,440 acres will be brought under irrigation.

Genial Traveling Man Has Odd Experiences

M. Sachs, who has been "making" Salt Lake for the last thirty years in the interests of the Hochstadter company of New York, arrived in the city yesterday with a fund of stories, all more or less true and all mainly about himself, to tell his friends.

Since his last visit here in June the genial Mr. Sachs spent three months' vacation in Germany visiting Vienna, Budapest, Berlin, Carlsbad, Breslau, Dresden, and "doing" Switzerland and the Alps. He witnessed Count Zeppelin's airship flight in Berlin, took an aerial trip himself, and to use his own words, "while the trip cost money, it was worth it, and I saw everything there was to see."

"At Frankfurt-on-Main, I went up in Percey's airship. It cost 50 marks to go up, but I'd have given 100 marks to go down before we were halfway up on the trip.

"I was fortunate on the day of Zeppelin's great flight. My room in the hotel faced the Unter-den-Linden, with a balcony in front of it. Zeppelin in his airship passed directly in front of me 250 feet away, and once as his machine made its sweeping curve, I thought sure he had sighted our seicels of Pils-

ner and was coming down to take one with us.

Mr. Sachs tells one on himself. One night in company with a friend, and garbed in a Havelock coat, which has something of a military style, he went for a stroll along the Unter-den-Linden. "I began to notice," he tells, "that every soldier we passed stopped and saluted. It struck me as funny that they should salute me, but I thought maybe it was a new courtesy. I thought they mistook me for someone, so without making any comment, I just returned the salutes. Finally we came to the guardhouse, and although I had begun to get accustomed to seeing the soldiers salute me, and to return it, I was staggered when I saw the guard hurriedly lined up and come to the salute. I thought that was too much and was just going to remark on it to my friend, when I happened to turn—and discovered that following immediately behind us was a general of the army. The salutes had all been for him, and I had nearly worked my arm off responding to them."

Mr. Sachs is of the opinion that Germany is rapidly displacing France and Paris as the objective point for the American tourists abroad.

CITY THREATENS TO MAKE COUNTY GO DRY

Gideon Snyder, in Ultimatum, Says The Water Will Be Turned Off.

The county commissioners have received a letter from City Treasurer Gideon Snyder that unless the county pays for the water used on the county side of the city and county building this water will be turned off altogether.

The county owes, according to the city's figures, about \$1,000, which has been running since the expiration of a contract on June 3, 1907. Under the law, the city cannot charge one department for water and not another. Thus, it is held by attorneys who have investigated the matter, the city cannot charge the board of control of the city and county building for water used in any part of the building, as the city and county own half interest in the whole building, not any one division.

County Commissioner John C. Mackay went through some old contracts and franchises yesterday and found one whereby the county gets sixty lamps free from a power company which was given a franchise through the county. Commissioner Mackay is of the opinion that these lamps are strung around the city and county building yard, the city side getting as much benefit as the county.

If this is the case, and the city insists upon the water charges being paid, the county will charge the city for this lighting for several years back. It is believed the city will forget about the water controversy and not push the matter.

WANTS FRIEND'S ESTATE

Mrs. Viola Muller Says She Is Entitled to Ruth Brewster's Property.

Claiming the ownership of all property left by Ruth Brewster, who died here on Aug. 18 last, Viola Muller filed suit in the district court yesterday against Otto Weber, administrator. Mrs. Muller says that for the last ten years she had been the constant companion and friend of Ruth Brewster, and for the many services she was assured that she would receive all of Ruth Brewster's property. She started in the service of Mrs. Brewster when only 13 years old in California.

Together they earned \$700, she says, which was the part payment on a piece of property in Salt Lake valued at \$3,500. She married George Muller with the consent of Mrs. Brewster, she says, and the three worked together, with the understanding that Mrs. Muller would receive everything left.

It is claimed that Mrs. Brewster once started about writing a will to this effect on Aug. 17, but died before it was completed.

Mrs. Muller asks for a decree entitling her to the estate of Ruth Brewster.

GIVES BAD CHECKS, BUT BLAMES ANOTHER MAN

"I got into bad company and I listened to others," was the explanation offered by 19-year-old Warlock Autoft when arraigned in police court yesterday morning charged with obtaining money under false pretenses. Autoft passed two checks on Morris Levy, a South State street merchant, and admits that the checks were bad, but says he was not responsible for the forgery. "A man by the name of Coleman fixed up the checks and I passed them," said Autoft. Autoft's home is in Provo. He was placed under \$200 bail, and will be given a hearing Dec. 14.
