

## HOW THE POOR OLD TRIBUNE SAVED \$50

The poor old Tribune is so accustomed to being its advertisers by continually refusing to show them what they pay, and so accustomed to being its readers by missing practically all the news every morning, that it has carried its line of bunco a little further.

The doddering, senile, "forty years ago" apology for a newspaper brought George Harris Donohue to Salt Lake to write "The Great Salt Lake Mystery." The poor old Tribune of course knew of Donohue's San Francisco police record, it knew of his flaccid, in Seattle, but was not deterred. Donohue wrote a story which was very capably filled in from time to time by Salt Lake people. The poor old Tribune announced that it would pay \$50 for the best solution of the story.

While Donohue's story of hand-ling the affair was so crude and the size of the Tribune circulation is so small that comparatively few people saw it or took any interest in it, yet a few answers were received. Now note the poor old Tribune's finesse. It wanted to save the \$50. Keeping faith with the public does not annoy the Tribune management. That \$50 had to be saved. And this is the way they saved it, as published on the first page of the Tribune last Monday morning.

"NO SOLUTION HELD TO BE MERITORIOUS."

"After carefully reading and analyzing the many solutions to the Great Salt Lake Mystery, submitted to the Tribune, the committee in charge of awarding the cash prize of \$50 which the Tribune offered for the best solution, the committee reported last night that it would be impossible to make any award, owing to the unexpected turn of the general theme of the solutions. It appeared in the Tribune last Saturday and Sunday mornings."

Dr. Neil Howell and Charles S. Pulver completely upset all calculations of the solutionists, which is to be regretted, as both the Tribune and the committee in charge of the award spent considerable labor in a vain effort to find just one solution which would be the best. And this is slightly near the real finale of the story. But there was none that even approached a solution sufficiently to be held as meritorious.

The Herald-Republican hoped that for the sake of newspaper decency, the Tribune would wake up and make the award to somebody. Any Tribune reader that followed the Salt Lake Mystery long enough to have any attempt at a solution certainly earned \$50.

## BONDS PROVE OF STRAW

Paper Accepted for Face Value of \$1,500 May Be Worthless.

Error in the preparation and acceptance of bonds aggregating \$1,500, presented for the release of prisoners against whom criminal charges had been made and who have since disappeared, has been instrumental in instituting loss of \$1,500 to the city and state. Charles J. Young and Ebel K. Alexander, representing themselves as Salt Lake property owners, signed bonds for the release of J. Thompson, charged with larceny. Thompson has disappeared and authorities are unable to find either Young or Alexander or any property they may own in Salt Lake. The bond in this case was for \$500. The other \$1,000 represents the bond for the two newsmen, Frank Smith and Simon Levin, who disappeared immediately after their release. Their bonds were made out in favor of the state of Utah. Yet the trial was ordered to take place before Judge J. M. Bowman, which the National Surety company, which presented the bonds, maintains is a violation of Salt Lake, a municipal corporation, and not directly related to the state of Utah.

## CLUB NOMINATIONS.

Committee Appointed to Name Men for Board of Governors.

In preparation for the annual election of the Commercial club the board of governors will meet today for the purpose of appointing a nominating committee, which will submit the names of five members as candidates to fill the place of retiring members on the governing board.

The nominating committee will consist of fifteen members of the club, and the names selected will be posted in the club ten days before the election, which occurs on the second Saturday in January. The five members of the board of governors to be elected will serve three-year terms.

## COMPLAINTS ISSUED.

Two Negroes Charged With Burglary in Entering Cleaning Shop.

Complaints were issued by the county attorney yesterday charging Frank Williams and William H. Savoy with burglary in the second degree for breaking into the Paris Cleaning company's shop, 41 South State street, on the night of December 1. Both are negroes, and Savoy is now in the county jail here. Williams is held by the police of Omaha, as a result of the confession of Savoy, and extradition papers will be filed with Governor William Spry today for approval and for the return of Williams.

## COLLECTION IS COSTLY

Holiday Dentist Loses Judgment for \$100 in Suit Brought by Patient.

It will cost L. J. Dull, a dentist of Holladay, \$100 to collect a debt of 50 cents from J. Edwin Hendrickson, if he does not appeal from the judgment of Judge J. J. Whitaker in the city court yesterday. Dull did some work for Hendrickson last August, putting his teeth in good condition. Hendrickson testified that Dull told him at the outset that the work would cost \$9.75, but when the work had been finished, Dull put in a bill for \$10.25.

Hendrickson was willing to pay the \$9.75, and went to the dentist's office with the money. Dull demanded the additional 50 cents, it was claimed, and a fight resulted, in which Hendrickson was roughly bumped around, finally bounding down a flight of stairs to the street level as a result of the impetus furnished by the dentist's foot and hands. Hendrickson brought suit for \$100 to solve his injuries, and Judge Whitaker agreed with him.
