Boy With Wanderlust Makes Life Interesting for Father.

Little Johnny Decker, son of Ernest Decker of this city, is playing a game at hide and seek with his father of such broad proportions that it has cost the latter nearly a hundred dollars in railroad fares in the attempt to keep track of his son in less than a month.

Johnny thinks it great sport, and, though he has been under arrest and threatened with confinement at the industrial school, he only makes his escapes more interesting. He is but thirteen years of age, yet he can give all the scientific expressions of the hobo of how best to ride a freight train and the rods of the passenger.

While looking for advice with the police yesterday Ernest Decker explained that he had last located his son in Pocatello. He says that while leaving the car which he and his son occupied, a few minutes at Ogden, he returned to find his son missing. He says that Johnny is not a bad boy, but is simply possessed with a desire for rough travel.

Reporting the loss of his boy to the Ogden police, he had him recovered, and with his hand gripped tightly at the youngster's sleeve brought him back to Salt Lake. Yesterday noon he asked that the youngster be locked up until he could devise some scheme of keeping him at home.

SUPERINTENDENT NELSON RETURNS FROM COAST

After a fortnight spent in California, visiting the schools of San Francisco, Sacramento and Berkeley, A. C. Nelson, state superintendent of public instruction, returned home yesterday and will now devote his attention to arranging for the convention of the State Teachers' association to be held in Salt Lake during the Christmas holidays.

STORM, NOT DAMAGING

Railroads Have Slight Delay, and Fair Weather Is Now Promised by Weather Prophet.

In spite of the stormy conditions that have prevailed in the last several days, very little trouble has been experienced by the railroad and telegraph companies. The Union Pacific Los Angeles Limited was the only train delayed for any length of time yesterday, being held up for more than twelve hours.

The Denver & Rio Grande got all their trains through on time yesterday, and the officers of the company did not expect to have any trouble with the storm, which appears to be local.

Fair weather promised for today by the weather man, who has the following to say in his report for yesterday: "East of the Rocky mountains the barometric pressure is below normal, accompanied by cloudy conditions, with rain or snow at many stations. A high pressure area of considerable energy has appeared in the extreme northwest, and now over-spreads the Pacific coast states and the plateau region, with clearing weather. Temperatures are above normal everywhere, except in the immediate Missouri valley, where they are somewhat below. The conditions indicate generally fair weather in this vicinity for Tuesday."

The weather map for yesterday shows that the precipitation for the year so far is just 3.50 inches above normal. Nearly every month of the year has been above normal, and the present month is now 1.35, as against 1.33 for the normal, with more than half of the month yet to be recorded.

The mean temperature for yesterday is again 25, the normal is 32.
