

### POLICEMAN'S PROBE MAKES HIM CONVERT

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preparation of property, if any, and in the case of insurance companies the sums other than dividends, paid within the year on policy and annuity contracts and the net addition, if any, required by law to be made within the year to reserve funds; (third) interest actually paid within the year on its bonded or other indebtedness to an amount not exceeding the paid-up capital stock of such corporation, joint stock company or association, or insurance company, outstanding at the close of the year, and in the case of a bank, banking association or trust company, all interest actually paid by it within the year on deposits. In case of corporations, joint stock companies and associations organized under the laws of a foreign country, the proportion of its paid-up capital stock outstanding at the close of the year which the gross amount of its income for the year from business transacted and capital invested within the United States and any of its territories, Alaska and the District of Columbia bears to the gross amount of its income derived from all sources within and without the United States; (fourth) all sums paid by it within the year for taxes imposed under the authority of the United States or of any state or territory thereof, or imposed by the government of any foreign country as a condition to carrying on business therein; (fifth) all amounts received by it within the year as dividends upon stock of other corporations, joint stock companies or associations, or loans.

ance companies, subject to the tax hereby imposed. The notices sent to each of the corporations in the three states contain blank forms upon which returns are to be made. Mercantile houses, operating under articles of incorporation, must provide inventories of stock on hand at the end of each year.

### Corporations Classified.

The corporations included in the wide scope of this law are summed up in the following classification.

Class A—Financial and commercial: including banks, banking associations, trust companies, guaranty and surety companies, title insurance companies, building associations (if for profit), and insurance companies, not specifically exempt.

Class B—Public service: Such as railroads, steamboat, ferryboat and stage-line companies, pipe-line, gas and electric light companies; express, transportation and storage companies; coal, lumber, grain, produce and all goods, wares and merchandise.

Class C—Industrial and manufacturing: Such as mining, lumber and coke companies; rolling mills; foundry and machine shops; sawmills; flour, woolen, cotton and other mills; manufacturers of other material; manufacturers or refiners of sugar, molasses, syrups or other products; ice and refrigerating plants; slaughterhouse, tannery, packing or canning companies, etc.

Class D—Miscellaneous: Such as architects, contractors, hotel, theatre or other companies or associations not otherwise classified as public service, industrial or manufacturing.

The penalties for violation of the act are severe. Any collector, deputy, agent or clerk or other employee who divulges any of the information contained in the returns shall be punishable by fine not to exceed \$1,000 or imprisonment not to exceed one year, or both. A fine ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000 may be imposed upon a corporation refusing to make returns at the proper time or for making false returns.

### CITY TO IGNORE CLAIM

#### Telluride Power Company Protest Will Be Left to Courts to Decide.

The city will ignore the claims and protest of the Telluride Power company in the condemnation proceedings instituted by the city against the East Jordan Canal company and now pending in the Third district court. This was decided at a specially called meeting of the committee on engineering, sewage and Jordan canal, held in the office of F. S. Richards and Ogden Hiles yesterday afternoon.

This report will be made to the city council at the recess session Thursday night. It was believed that an attorney for the Telluride Power company would attend the meeting and set out the claims of the company in regard to the fight it will make against the city condemning the East Jordan canal. The committee decided that the matter would have to be settled by the courts, at any rate, and will recommend to the council that the protest of the Telluride Power company be received and filed, thus forcing the company to go into the courts to establish its rights in the attempt of the city to condemn the canal for the purpose of enlarging it and thus improving the water system of the city.



### DEATH OF JOHN LLOYD

#### Pioneer Shoemaker of Salt Lake, Who Retired After Thirty Years.

The funeral of John Lloyd, pioneer, successful shoe merchant and a man of wide acquaintance in the intermountain states, will be held at his home Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Mr. Lloyd died Monday afternoon at his home, 23 East South Temple street. He was 69 years of age. A little over 40 years ago Lloyd came to Salt Lake for his home. He at once directed his interest toward the making of shoes and in their sale. He was one of the first shoe merchants in Salt Lake, and continued his pursuit for 30 years. He retired only when his health began to fail him. Mr. Lloyd was a thorough reader and had an unusual acquaintance with the literature of the past century as well as much of the present.

Mr. Lloyd is survived by three sons, John Lloyd, a Salt Lake shoe merchant; William Lloyd, a grocer of this city, and who ten years ago was noted as one of the most capable baseball players in the intermountain district, and Walter Lloyd, a Salt Lake druggist. He is also survived by four daughters, Mrs. John May, Tacoma, Wash.; Mrs. John Costina, San Francisco, and Mrs. William Dodge and Mrs. Lon Platt of Salt Lake.
