

DANGER TO FRUIT SAID TO BE PREDICTIONS ARE FOR WARMER WEATHER WITHOUT PROSPECTS OF ANY FROSTS.

INSPECTOR INVESTIGATES J. EDWARD TAYLOR BELIEVES LOSSES OVERESTIMATED.

No further damage to fruit crops as the result of frost is expected in this district for the time being at least. While the indications last night were for light frosts in the more exposed places, it was not believed there would be any general frost damage, and the cheerful information was given out that fruit growers might spend the night in peace. Rising temperature was the order yesterday, and the indications are for a continued advance today.

The weather bureau yesterday reported a mean rise of 2 degrees Friday night over Thursday night, making the lowest temperature 35 degrees. The forecast for today and degrees is for a steady rise in the temperature.

That the heavy frost of Thursday and Friday nights did not injure all of the fruit in the state, was the statement made last night by J. Edward Taylor, state horticultural inspector, upon his return from Brigham City, where he made an exhaustive examination of the orchards there. The damage in that vicinity, he said, appeared to be in streaks, and some localities were not injured in the slightest.

At Pleasant Grove.

Of especial interest is the fact that the "smudging" appears to have been successful in the places where it was carried out consistently. The amount of the saving of fruit was brought about by the work done by fruit growers in heating their orchards. Mr. Taylor stated that he was not now prepared to give actual figures on the damage to the crop at the present time, and it will be several days before the returns are all in so that a careful report can be made.

Discouraging reports continue to come in from various parts of the state. At Pleasant Grove an immense amount of damage was done to the fruit crops. While many of the fruit growers have their orchards protected and others built fires, it was not sufficient to avert the damage. Pears and cherries suffered while most of the peaches escaped without harm. The frost was more severe on Provo bench, where it is reported that a vast amount was caused there by fog that guarded against the impending frost. The temperature dropped to 26 degrees and the hope is held out for any fruit crops in this district.

Reports from Bountiful are that the damage was not quite so great as first reported. There was no wind and the temperature registered not lower than 34 degrees.

More detailed reports of the loss to fruit in Salt Lake county was told yesterday at the meeting of the Salt Lake County Horticultural society, held in the county commissioners' rooms in the city and county building. It was stated by county inspectors and others that the crops of all stone fruit—such as cherries, apricots, peaches and peaches—are practically ruined as a result of the heavy frosts of Thursday and Friday nights, and in many cases the apples, pears and other fruit will be less than half a crop.

Smudging Saves Fruit.

J. M. Smith of Draper, one of the deputies, reported that in a talk with William Boice of Granite it was learned that all of the stone fruit in Granite was killed, as well as most of the apples and pears. Mr. Smith smudged all of Thursday and Friday nights, but raised the temperature only about 2 degrees in his orchard, with the result that much of his crop will be lost. The thermometer fell to about 26 degrees.

MORE JUVENILES MISBEHAVE.

Either the juvenile court officers of the state are more active, or the young people of the state are misbehaving more. This is shown in reports received by John K. Hardy, secretary of the state juvenile court commission, for the first three months of the year. In fourteen counties thus far reporting it is shown that 194 cases have been handled, as against 374 for the whole of last year. If this record is continued throughout 1910, for the year will be more than double that of a year ago.

Kindergarten Children to Be Given Medical Examinations

At the meeting of the members of the Free Kindergarten held Friday afternoon at No. 424 South Fourth West street, arrangements were made whereby Dr. Bella A. Gemmill will weekly examine the children of the school and see that they are given first class medical treatment. In connection with the medical examination a free dispensary will also be conducted by Dr. Gemmill for the children.

The meeting was called by Miss Nellie Shermer, who has charge of the school, for the purpose of discussing the affairs of the children. Dr. Gemmill volunteered to address the mothers on the care of the proper food for growing children. During her address she said:

"Candy in the pure form is one of the best things which can be given to a growing child, providing that some discretion is taken in its use. If a child could have one piece of good, pure candy each day it would greatly help in their nourishment. The great evil from candy is that as a general rule children get the candy in large amounts and as a result they are made sick. If a child could be given one piece of candy each day and be made to understand that that was all it could have, it would take away the great craving which all children have for the sweet-

meat." She then told the mothers that the next greatest evil is candy over-feeding was a general over-feeding.

"If a mother," said the doctor, "would give a child one-half as much water as one does solid food, the child would be healthier and its nutrition would be greater."

FIFTY TEAMS AT WORK IMPROVING EAST BENCH

Visitors to the east bench these days are attracted by the great amount of work being done there in improving the numerous additions, and especially with the activity shown in the Liberty Heights section, just east of Thirteenth East and south of Tenth South. All the work there has been fifty teams and over one hundred men at work there grading and laying out the plat. The addition has been on the market only a few weeks, yet work has been pushed so rapidly that already the contractors have commenced to put in the five-foot sidewalks on the new streets, and the curbing and guttering of the streets will be started in a short time. Over \$100,000 will be expended in improvements, and it is the intention of the owners to make the tract a second Federal Heights.

INDICTS INDIAN FOR FIRST DEGREE MURDER

Grand Jury Returns True Bill Against Red Man in Federal Court.

In order that the United States circuit court, which convenes Monday, may have some case to try, a partial report was yesterday forenoon made by the grand jury. An indictment was returned against Zho-ne, a Navajo Indian, for murder in the first degree. November 18 last Zho-ne shot and killed a trader named Charles Fritz, at Westman, on the Navajo Indian reservation.

The story of the alleged murder smacks of the days when the Indians wore war paint and killed white men as a result of their traditional grudge. According to the testimony, Zho-ne was fed by the trader at his store near Heffernan. The Indian left the store, and returned later, murdered Fritz, robbed the store of what money there was in the cash till and rode away on his pony. He was arrested two days later by Indian police. Zho-ne is alleged to have made a confession that he had killed the Indian was in court yesterday ready to plead, but Judge Marshall held that a plea could not be accepted in the United States district court, but that it must come up in the circuit court. Hence Zho-ne will plead Monday. He has informed the court he has no money, so an attorney will be appointed to defend him.

OFFICIALS WILL ASK UNIFORM FOOD LAWS

Boise Convention Starts Movement to Make Rules Same in All States.

Well satisfied with the result of the first interstate pure food convention held at Boise April 12 and 13, Willard Hansen, state food and dairy commissioner, and Herman Harms, state chemist, returned yesterday from that city. The report that the meeting was largely attended by those interested in the pure food movement and that much good will naturally result from the conference.

One of the objects of the convention was to secure the enactment of uniform laws in the various states so that there will be no clash in their operation and be as nearly as possible in conformity with the federal pure food laws.

Mr. Hansen was successful in getting what is considered an important measure introduced in the general resolution adopted by the convention. It is demanded that the names and addresses of all manufacturers appear on all labels of goods and drinks which come within the pure food law.

The following is the resolution in a nutshell adopted by the convention: "That 'near beer' involves questions at issue between 'wet' and 'dry' Food commissioners decide to leave question of percentage of alcohol necessary to form an intoxicating beverage to prosecuting attorneys throughout west. "State laws, rules and regulations to be changed to conform to United States corresponding measures. "Demand that name and address of manufacturer appear on all labels of goods and drinks. "No action to be taken by states in bleached flour cases until controversy is decided by the board of federal courts. "Determination of mooted food problems to be left to United States government."

ADDS \$75,000 TO WEALTH OF STATE

Decision Handed Down by Land Office That Utah Selections Are Non-Mineral.

Through a concurrent decision rendered yesterday by the register and receiver of the United States land office in Salt Lake, the State of Utah is richer by about \$75,000, and unless the government appeals to the commissioner of the general land office at Washington, the state's right of selection to about 1,000 acres of valuable lands in Carbon county is established.

In 1904 the state made selections of government lands in Carbon county for land for a deaf and dumb institution, for reservation purposes and an insane asylum. Although as early as 1873 the surveyor general filed a plat of the lands in controversy designating them as mineral lands, the state made the selections upon the basis that the lands so selected were non-mineral and were grazing or agricultural lands. Again in 1873 the lands chosen by the state in Carbon county were classified as coal lands by the United States geological survey and valued at \$50 an acre.

April 19, 1909, the government sought to set aside the selections made by the state and commenced suit against the state. The case has been pending for a year before the register and receiver of the office at Washington, during which time a number of witnesses and experts as to the character of the land have been examined. It is presumed that the land selected is non-mineral and non-coal lands was made largely upon the opinion of Joseph A. Taft, a geologist connected with the department.

The finding of the register and receiver was to the effect that while the lands selected were in Carbon county by the state were in a coal region, coal did not exist to such an extent that it could be mined at a profit and that the land had more value for grazing and agricultural purposes.

Since the state made its selection the value has increased in value about 25 per cent.

BYHOWER SPARES TREES

City and County Building Grounds Will Not Be Denuded.

None of the evergreen trees flanking the sidewalk leading to the city and county building from Fourth South and State streets are to be cut down, according to Nicholas Byhower, city superintendent of parks. Mr. Byhower said yesterday that instead of cutting down the evergreens, Linden trees would be planted between the trees now standing and that at some time in the future the evergreens would probably have to fall.
