In order to send out a greater number of competent engineers and to enrich the general field of engineering work with new discoveries, the engineering department of the university has decided to offer the following fellowships the coming year: The Wall fellowship in mining, metallurgy and ore dressing, which is worth \$500 a year; two schools of mine fellowships, the annual value of each being \$350. The applicant must be graduated from some college or university of recognized standing by July 1. He must be qualified to enter upon research work in any of the engineering departments. During the school year a fellow must be a resident student of the University of Utah, devoting one-third to one-half of his work under the direction of the head of the department and the remainder of his time to study. The Wall fellowship is assigned to the departments of mining and metallurgy only and requires one-half of the student's time. The other fellowships may be awarded to any of the engineering departments, including those of mining and metallurgy. Applications will be received by Dean J. F. Merrill up until May 15. Applicants should mention the department in which they wish to work and if unknown to the committee they should send references concerning character, scholarship and ability. BLIND WORKERS HAPPY

Their Little Factory is Busy Turning Out Various Articles for Household Uses. The industrial workshop for the blind, which is fostered by the state, and in charge of S. W. Jenkinson, is temporarily located in the titling house, and is a busy place. There are ten persons, all totally blind, at work every afternoon except Sunday. There are four women and six men. All but one of the number are engaged in making brushes. Several have become proficient and turn out brushes of good, substantial quality in a surprisingly short time. Despite their affliction the workers form a happy little band. They sing and joke while plating their fingers on the material into articles for household use. One of the blind men devotes all his time to putting caps on chairs. He earns from \$1.25 to \$1.50 a day. Superintendent Jenkinson, who is also blind, is well pleased with the progress which is being made.

PUBLICITY CAMPAIGN WILL BE NATION WIDE

Commercial Club Bureau Maps Out Ambitious Plans to Advertise Utah and Salt Lake. The recently appointed governing committee of the Commercial club's publicity bureau, named to undertake a nation-wide advertising campaign in the interests of Salt Lake and Utah, held its first meeting at the club yesterday, the gathering being one of the most enthusiastic ever held in Salt Lake. The meeting was devoted to a general exchange of ideas, and the members one and all pledged themselves to get to work right away and bring about the desired results. Joseph E. Caine, secretary of the general committee, read the plan of operations and the committee concurred in each project. Special emphasis was laid upon the fact that the campaign of education should begin at home and to this end members of the committee will accompany the state excursion of the Commercial club in May. A decision was reached that the proposed executive committee should be increased from five to seven members, and that the president and secretary of the club should be included. Talks were made by President Joy H. Johnson, W. W. Armstrong, Governor William Spry, Mayor John S. Bransford, C. W. Nibley, T. R. Cutler, George E. Merrill, John S. Critchlow, E. O. Howard, O. C. Beebe, H. W. Walker, C. W. Johnson, George S. Auerbach, W. H. Sherman and Secretary Joseph E. Caine. President Johnson, as chairman of the general publicity bureau committee, was then authorized to appoint the executive committee with the understanding that the committee work out further necessary details for raising funds and conducting the affairs of the bureau, and to report its results at the next meeting. The executive committee, as named by the president, follows: W. W. Armstrong, chairman; A. W. Carlson, George E. Merrill, E. O. Howard, O. C. Beebe, Joy H. Johnson and Joseph E. Caine. This committee will meet early next week and devise ways and means for properly exploiting the resources and advantages of Utah and Salt Lake, while the general committee will meet some time early in May.
