Innovation in Teaching Proves Valuable and Will Be Made Permanent.

(Special to The Herald-Republic.) Ogden, May 22.—That the first year of the sub-high school plan in Ogden has proven a positive success in every way is the statement of D. H. Adams, the prominent educator who was placed in charge of the new institution last year.

About 150 students will leave the school this coming week more fit to enter upon a high school course than any corps of eighth grade graduates yet turned out in Ogden. The sub-high school is a gathering of most of the eighth grade students of the public schools into one institution, where special preparatory courses fitting them for the high school are given.

CITIZENS INTEND TO VOTE FOR WATERWORKS BONDS SO NO BURDEN WILL MEASURE FUTURE.

(Special to The Herald-Republic.) Provo, May 22.—A special meeting of the city council for tomorrow at 8 a. m. has been called by Mayor J. W. Powers, in conformity with the request of the citizens' mass meeting Saturday night to consider the advisability of canceling the bond election called for next Tuesday, and calling another bond election to vote on the issue of \$30,000 waterworks bonds. At the meeting Saturday night it was urged that to permit the water from the springs to flow into the river and otherwise to be used for irrigation would finally result in the city losing its rights. The conditions in Salt Lake which compelled that city to spend immense sums of money for cottonwood canyon water were referred to, and there is no doubt that the taxpayers here will be warned by that example and vote the waterworks bonds.

BEGINS WITH CLEMENCY.

King George Grants Remission of Short Sentences in Army and Navy. London, May 22.—King George has commenced his reign with an act of clemency granting a remission of short sentences and reduction of others throughout the kingdom and in the army and navy. He has also issued a touching letter "to my people," expressing grateful appreciation of the affection the nation has shown him since his accession, and how so sudden and unlooked for that it might well have been overwhelming. It is announced that King George intends to maintain a royal racing stable at Newmarket and a breeding stud at Sandringham and that he will patronize racing on the same extensive scale as his father.

SIXTY THOUSAND ATTEND SERVICE.

Szentochowa, Russia, May 22.—Sixty thousand pilgrims from Russian and other countries gathered here for a service in connection with the consecration of the jeweled crown presented to the emperor by the Polish people to replace the crown which was stolen from the chapel of the Pauline convent on October 22. Special trains brought pilgrims from Warsaw and various other points, but the majority of them came from the city of Szentochowa, which was observed as a holiday throughout Poland.
